Dollar\$ & \$ense

Hope you had a great Fourth of July and are enjoying your Summer. The first half of the year is already gone, so that means it's time to start our budgeting process for 2020. A preliminary

budget was generated in June and now comes the refinement task over the next four months. One of the major items in our budget each year is insurance. We spend approximately \$225,000 in insurance costs each year. We have liability and casualty insurance coverage for all of our assets. We have insurance for our vehicles and boat, including coverage for their drivers. We provide Director and Officer liability insurance. We provide excellent health, dental and life coverage for our fulltime employees. Then there are various insurance policies for our pre-school as well as insurance coverage for not only our employees but also for vendors that perform work on-site.

As you know, insurance costs continue to increase year over year. We do our best to have good coverage while still controlling costs. I would like to share two examples of our efforts to control costs.



First, we were actually able to reduce our overall medical costs in 2019 relative to 2018 by nearly 10% by making some adjustments in our coverage while still maintaining excellent

health benefits for our employees. (Our insurance broker indicated that amongst all of their customers, our medical benefits were in the top 5%.) We are looking at holding the line flat in 2020 when rates are determined in September of this year.

Secondly, due to our excellent safety record, our workman's compensation insurance in 2019 is 5% lower than our costs were in 2018. And, more good news, our 2020 costs will be reduced another 5% based on our new contract. These savings will help counter some minor increases in other insurance costs.

The budgeting process will continue until the Board of Directors approves the final version, usually no later than October. Between now and that time, we will continue to fine-tune the 2020 Operating Budget. If you are interested in more of the details comprising our budget, plan to attend our joint budget session of the Budget/Finance Committee and Board of Directors, tentatively to be announced in September.

Water Awareness

Plenty of Warm Days Ahead

June 21st, the longest day of the year, also marked the beginning of shorter days and less sun exposure. However, there are still plenty of

warm days ahead of us. Finding a way to get out of the sun is on everyone's mind, except on those water-splashing, tubing, pool time kind of days. And the pools on the Ranch are very inviting right now. Sometimes it seems like there is not enough sunscreen available to protect the little ones as they play on the splash pad at La Casita.

This time of year, evaporation of water from our pools is at its zenith. Almost a full half inch of water evaporates each day from the pools here in the desert: One-half inch for every square foot of pool surface area. While the sun is a big driver in evaporating pool water, evaporation happens around the clock. The dry air claims some of the water taken up overnight, especially if there is any wind. Covering the pool can minimize evaporation during the periods the pool is not in use, but only if you remember to use the pool cover. Leaks are also one of the many culprits that render one's water savings efforts moot. Surveillance for leaks in the pump, piping and other mechanical features must be a routine.

Fortunately, our landscaping doesn't need sunscreen, but it does need our attention. An errant drip system can rob plants and trees of the water they need. Usually, a good soaking two or three times a month will allow the water to percolate deep into the ground. Deep watering creates a healthy deep root system for many plants.

For the lawns, the amount of water applied during the peak watering months can be reduced to the minimum amount needed by the grass. While the lawn might appear dry and dead, the grass is just dormant and will be fresh again when the temperature moderates. We reduce the amount of water applied to the Ranch common areas to save water that can then be used to establish the Winter grass.

The Summer months also portend the coming of the monsoon rains. Tropical storms build off the coast of Baja California and head for Hawaii. Occasionally, one of those storms heads our way and can produce intense storms unleashing volumes of rain. Usually, our lakes can hold the runoff if we make just a little room. That is why the lake water levels are down during the monsoon season. Sometimes though, the rain is just too intense and can cause widespread street flooding and cause the lakes to overflow their banks. Be on the lookout during these intense Summer storms!

Beyond the Quagga Mussels and Red Slider Turtiles Protecting Our Lakes From Threatening Aquative Invasive Species... by Brian Lynam

The Dobson Ranch Lake system exists primarily to manage and contain the storm runoff in our community. The lakes are fed roughly 20% to 30% from storm runoff and 70% to 80% from the SRP lake and canal system. The storm runoff entering our lakes also brings organic debris from the roads and organic matter that drops off trees and plants around the lakes. Much of that organic matter lays at the bottom of the lakes and breaks down over time.

In May, the Lake Habitat Committee proposed to have an underwater aerator system installed at the bottom of Lake 8, with the intent to eventually install similar systems in all of the lakes. The HOA Board approved this proposal and work to install 15 underwater aerator heads in Lake 8 has recently started. After consultation with experts, it was determined that the 15-head aerator system is required due to the lake shape and size. This will help speed up the decomposition of lake debris and add sufficient oxygen to the water to maintain healthy aquatic life. The continuous water movement will assist with lake cleanup by pushing surface debris to the shore where maintenance can more easily remove it. The water movement also helps reduce mosquitoes and midge flies, stagnant water odors and the development of algae.

In the past, we have tried to avoid algae issues by adding dye to the lakes in order to prevent photosynthesis that the algae need to bloom. But, photosynthesis is also needed to grow

zooplankton and phytoplankton. Phytoplankton, which feed on the zooplankton, are the basic food source for a variety of marine species, from tiny fish larvae, such as Bluegill, all the way up to giant Catfish. Both zooplankton and phytoplankton not only play a vital role in the stability of the marine ecosystem, but they also serve as an indicator of water health, since they are



affected by slight changes in the environment. Using the underwater aeration systems to assist in avoiding chemical treatments will help maintain our natural food chain and balance in the lakes.


Beyond the Quagga Mussels and Red Slider Turtles mentioned in the June 2019 issue of Ranchers' Roundup, there are other Aquatic Invasive Species threatening us from which we need to protect our lakes. One is the Apple Snail which has been found in Tempe Town Lake. Originating from China, they are often introduced by irresponsible pet owners, live for 3 months, then leave their shells behind to create debris at the lake bottom and shores. Gizzard Shad was found in Roosevelt Lake in 2016. Gizzard Shad can take a lake over and eat themselves out of food, eliminating the native wildlife species. Chinese Carp have taken over the backwaters of the Mississippi River. They are known to jump 10 feet out of the water at boats. Under ARIZONA REVISED STATUTE 17-255, it is illegal to release invasive aquatic species into the water systems of Arizona. This means any aquatic species that is not native to our ecosystem whose introduction or presence in this state may cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health.


The Lake Habitat Committee's goal is to create a healthy lake system and encourage the development of a proper aquatic environment and food chain. This will help to make

> our lakes more beautiful and enjoyable, while helping to fight off the invasive species that could damage our sensitive lake environment.

Quagga Mussels



The Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee

Preserving the Guidelines for an Appealing Aesthetic... by Lynelle Glysson

G This document that appeared to change everything, in fact, kept things the same.

In January 2019, when I was hired by the Association to be your Community Manager, the community was engaged in lively discussions regarding the Residential Architectural Guidelines. As the months progressed, there was a document that surfaced and enlightened us all. The Appointment of Successor Architectural Control Committee was filed in 1998 with the county recorder. This document that appeared to change everything, in fact, kept things the same. It was meant to maintain the authority of the Architectural Control Committee. It states that each Declaration provided that the aesthetic quality of the property subject to the Declaration shall be maintained by an Architectural Control Committee. The ACC was set to terminate unless a written instrument shall have been executed by the then owners of a majority of the lots. This was done in 1998.

To obtain documentation, I did extensive research including pulling Plat Maps and declarations from the county assessors' website and going through boxes and files of original documents. I spoke to Dale Douglas, a prior Executive Director, and many other former board members and staff members who were here when this process was executed. They were clear in the intent of the Guidelines; they were meant to maintain an appealing aesthetic in Dobson Ranch. The Association engaged a top-notch attorney, **Donald Dyekman**, to assist with the daunting task of uniting the Architectural Control Committee over the entire Ranch. Thankfully, each Ranchers' RoundUp has been preserved and I was able to review several articles and announcements about the adoption of the Architectural Control Committee and its Guidelines.

According to the document filed, the ACC is now the Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee. This committee has the rights



and powers and the same duties and liabilities as the previously named Architectural Control Committee. What this means to the homeowners of Dobson Ranch is that the DRAC, and not the Board, has the authority to enforce, change and implement Residential Architectural Guidelines. I have documents that date back to 1983 that state the guidelines and

they are very similar to our current Guidelines.

The Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee members were appointed by the Board of Directors at the April 18, 2019 meeting. These members were selected from the applications received. The members are Kate O'Hara, Nicole Lynam and Chairperson Louis Thiele.

The Committee has reviewed the DRAC Charter and it will be presented to the Board for approval in July. The DRAC also discussed that if rules or guidelines need to be approved, they will be fair and reasonable. The community, I believe, wants to maintain a quality aesthetic that does not unduly restrict the ability to enjoy their homes, hobbies and interests. The community also wants to maintain the value of their homes. Certain guidelines are necessary to maintain an appealing aesthetic. People work hard to maintain their homes and do not want the poor maintenance of a neighbor to reduce their property values.

The Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee will be meeting every second and fourth Tuesday. They will meet regularly to review Architectural Review submissions. These meetings are open to all residents. To maintain the privacy of the homeowners, they will only refer to the submission number. They are obligated to review each submittal against the Guidelines to ensure they are followed. They do not let their personal preferences enter into their decisions. Their guide is what is allowed and not allowed by the Residential Architectural Guidelines.

I hope this information has been helpful and alleviates some concerns that have been brought to my attention. If you do have any questions, please contact me directly at lglysson@dobsonranch.com. Landscaping Tips 🌃

Cactus: The Heart of Arizona Desert Landscapes

Cactus can give that authentic touch of native dignity that seems to legitimize and compliment Arizona desert landscapes. They make excellent specimen plants or striking accents. The Cactus family numbers over 2000 species. Typically cactus are devoid of leaves and have swollen stems, spines or scales. All cacti are native to the New World and are found from North America to the southern tip of South America.

The thick waxy coated stems are quite resistant to moisture evaporation, which gives them considerable drought tolerance. Desert cacti are leafless; however, most have spines. Photosynthesis (food production for the plant) occurs within the green outer cortex of the stems, and moisture reserves are stored in the internal

part of the stems, sustaining these plants through prolonged dry periods of desert climates.

Structural support for cactus plants is provided by internal fibrous or woody skeletal forms. Most cacti have tapering tap roots that anchor the plant and fleshy lateral roots close to the soil surface that extend outward for several feet in all directions. These absorb and store moisture and nutrients. The rose-like flowers of cacti, which are contrastingly delicate and beautifully colored, produce edible, although sometimes not too palatable, fruit.



Transplanting

Transplanting is usually necessary since cacti seldom occur naturally in desired landscape locations. Although they can be transplanted year-round in southern Arizona's lower elevations, quicker reestablishment can be expected from Golden Barrel cactus

March through October. Warmer temperatures favor active root growth and, consequently, quicker establishment of the transplant.

Transplant cacti in their original directional orientation. This is very important! The south and southwest sides of these plants become toughened and resistant to sunburn. The more tender north or east sides are likely to sunburn and scar and may rot if exposed to the intense hot sun. Before transplanting, mark the north side with chalk or ribbon, and replant with that side again to the north. To aid in protecting against sunburning, the newly transplanted plants may be covered with a piece of shade cloth. The shade cloth should be left on until signs of new growth and establishment occur.

PROTECT YOUR LANDSCAPE INVESTMENT Is your landscaper SLM Certified?

Cactus transplants should be placed in a shaded, open area for one to two weeks after digging to allow the fresh-cut roots to heal before transplanting. Replant cacti in dry soil and do not irrigate until new growth appears at the apex (*tips*) of the plant which may take several weeks.

Consult with a landscape professional for help transplanting large cacti such as Saguaro cactus.

At the Lakes





Ducks and other wildfowl pass through this area during the migration season. Dobson Ranch is just one of the many stops along their route north and back. Most will move on, but some with stay to become semi-permanent residents in our lakes and pools. Migratory waterfowl, including ducks, will often stay in one place because it is easy; they

become lazy and in the process they become polluters.

We love that our residents care about the critters at the Dobson Ranch lakes, but did you know that feeding our duck friends could harm them?

Ducks know when there is a free meal available. They will accept food handed or thrown at them, whether good for them or not. Those morsels, like bread, are not part of their normal diet.

Bread doesn't contain the nutrients or calories ducks need to survive and thrive. If you fill them up with an easy meal of soggy bread, the ducks won't eat enough of the nutritious food they really need. Adult birds who feast on carbs are more likely to get fat and sick. Meanwhile, ducklings need to learn how to forage for healthy food on their own. Bread also causes Angel Wing which can make duck feathers grow too quickly, straining muscles and may even inhibit flying.

Also, the bread that ducks don't eat attracts rats and grows unhealthy algae, which kills our fish and pollutes the water, making it harmful to dogs and other wildlife. Do not allow pets or children to chase or disturb the wildlife on the Ranch.

Litter can hurt birds as well, so be sure to dispose of all litter, including bags, plastic items and moldy scraps.

Also, when you feed the ducks, more ducks will come. Lots of ducks means lots of duck poop. One duck can add 50 pounds of manure a year to a lake, making this area's fecal contamination very high.

> So, please do everyone's waterways a favor... Don't feed the ducks!

The Mesa Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities Department has become the first parks and recreation organization in the U.S. and the world to become a Certified Autism Center, a designation from the International Board of Credentialing and Continuing Education Standards (IBCCES) that demonstrates the organization's commitment to ensuring

guests with autism and sensory sensitivities have the best possible experience.

"Mesa is well known as a destination for families to both live and visit," Mayor **John Giles** said. "I am proud that our Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities Department took that priority a step further to ensure that children on the autism spectrum have a fun experience in Mesa."

Approximately 500 employees of the Mesa Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities Department recently completed awareness and sensitivity training, as well as an onsite review by IBCCES of multiple parks and facilities.

13th Annual Mesa Hydration Donation Campaign Well Underway

The 13th Annual Mesa Hydration Donation Campaign began on June 3 and runs through September 27. This year's goal is to collect 400,000 bottles of water to help people in need during the extreme Summer heat.

With temperatures hitting triple digits on a regular basis, the City of Mesa is working with nonprofit agencies and businesses to provide supplies of water to people in need. Residents of Mesa have been asked to donate water at various drop-off locations throughout the City, including La Casita Recreation Center at Dobson Ranch.

"The campaign is a life saver for the less fortunate during the hot Summer months. Our residents have been very generous in donating bottles of water in previous years, and I know they are ready to do so again," Mesa Mayor **John Giles** said.

In addition to collecting bottles of water, the Mesa Hydration Donation Campaign raises awareness of the importance of staying hydrated. That is why the Mesa Water Resources Department is installing Hydration Stations in the downtown area to provide a sustainable source of drinking water to people outside in the heat, including those most vulnerable to triple digit temperatures. So far, three Hydration Stations have been installed at the Mesa Public Library, Mesa Arts Center and Pioneer Park. More stations will be added as donations are collected through the Hydration Donation program. "The addition of the new Hydration Stations in downtown can really be a game changer when it comes to making sure people are getting the hydration they need. Not only are they available day and night for those who need them, they are environmentally friendly," Councilmember **Jen Duff** said. "Our goal is to get water to as many people who need it as possible, and these stations will enable us to help more people than ever stay hydrated."

United Food Bank distributes donated water to numerous nonprofit organizations in Mesa and throughout the valley inluding A New Leaf - East Valley Men's Center, Paz de Cristo and Mesa United Way. Since the campaign began in 2007, more than 3.7 million bottles of water have been donated.

"The Mesa Hydration Donation Campaign is a great way for businesses, nonprofit groups and other associations like Dobson Ranch HOA to network and organize efforts to collect cases of water," Mesa Chamber of Commerce President and CEO **Sally Harrison** said. "For the past few years, the Mesa Chamber has organized friendly competitions to get water donations and help a great life-saving cause and we are happy to do so again."

One way to boost donations is the **One Ton Water Challenge**. Promoted by the Mesa Chamber of Commerce, United Food Bank and the City of Mesa, it challenges businesses, residents, clubs, and organizations to buy a pallet of water, which weighs more than a ton, for under \$150. 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
