
today, it is a special place.

On the top corner it says, "Return to: The City of Mesa Planning Dept." Shhhh, I won't tell if you won't!

It is fascinating to read someone's idea and then look up and see the fruition of it on the Ranch. The developers were very conscious of making the community a place that would produce an "environment of living." To define what that meant, they outlined every aspect of the development. They were purposeful in there planning of a variety of homes and neighborhoods within the Ranch. The amenities of lakes, parks and walking paths was paramount to the developer in creating a feeling of community.

I am excited to be a part of what was started way back when and looking forward to the future of the Ranch. I will be making copies of the original renderings and hanging them in the office if you want to come see them.

Fall Brings Changes at the Ranch

Before I knew what was happening, Labor Day was in the past. Strange how we look forward to the last of the 100° F days. Typically, we experience over 100 such days and I am glad when

they are finished. Fall also portends the changes that come when Summer is gone.

Many interesting events happen this time of year; our **Bark In The Park** and **Fall Expo** to mention two. These events happen on the green lawns of Laguna Park and the shores of the Los Altos Recreation Center.

In our desert, lawns are not a small deal. They should be small as they must be tended and nourished year-round. The Fall is the time of year when the winter lawn is established; seed put down and extra water applied to ensure germination. On the common areas the summer turf was forced to live on just a little water. Why? The Bermuda grass we use can take dry periods, periods we term Reverse Season Irrigation. That means we provide just enough water for the lawns to survive in the heat of Summer. The water saved, and it is substantial, is then used to establish and water a winter grass that does not need as much water.

In the Fall we also welcome our Winter visitors, both the ones who drive to the Ranch and the ones that fly in and take over our lakes. These birds find the Dobson Ranch Lakes a convenient resting place on their way from their northern breeding grounds. They are welcome to rest and move on to their Winter homes. Those that stay can become a source of the pollution

that infects our lakes. They stay because they are given food; food that doesn't have the nourishment they need, and they become addicted to too much food. Some like the coots, the small black bird that takes forever to lift off the water, resist the junk

food thrown into the water.

They leave no worse the wear from their visit.

The ducks, on the other hand, stuff themselves with food they cannot digest, get sick and make a mess of our lakes. The



handouts lack the energy they need to migrate. They circulate between the local lakes bringing invasive plants with them as they look for junk food. Please do not feed the ducks. Let them be wild, after all they are wild things.

I Heard It Through the Grapevine

Oh, how phrases get twisted when traveling through the grapevine! So twisted, in fact, that the concept makes for a great game for kids and

adults to play.

Do you remember playing "Whisper Down the Lane" or "Telephone" when you were younger?

The usual scenario goes like this: Players form a line, and the first player comes up with a message and whispers it into the ear of the second person in the line. The second player repeats the message to the third player, and so on. When the last player is reached, they announce the message they heard to the entire group. The first person then compares the original message with the final version.

Although the objective is to pass around the message without it becoming garbled along the way, part of the enjoyment is that this usually ends up happening. Errors typically accumulate in the retellings, so the statement announced by the last player differs significantly from that of the first player, usually with amusing or humorous effect. Reasons for changes include anxiousness or impatience, the difficult-to-understand mechanism of whispering, and that some players may deliberately alter what is being said to guarantee a changed message by the end of the line.

This game is often invoked as a metaphor for "the snowball effect", especially the inaccuracies as rumors or gossip spread, or, more generally, for the unreliability of human recollection.

It's been said by AZ Central columnist **Harvey Mackay**, that gossip is like soft butter. "It's easy to spread and adds a little flavor to just about everything. But trying to "unspread" it is just about impossible. There is always a little residue left behind, a greasy spot that's hard to clean up."

So, if you are part of the Dobson Ranch rumor mill, make sure the original message "The eagle soars above the trees" doesn't end up as "The beagle with the knobby knees."

Reducing Plant Debris Buildup in our Lakes by Brian Lynam

Dobson Ranch Lakes were made primarily to retain stormwater and has a watershed area of over 5,000 acres. All the stormwater comes from the streets and surrounding lots. It carries a lot of sediment and dead plant matter (bio-mass) into our lakes. Untrimmed trees and plants around the lakes can also add to the plant debris and make it harder to maintain the high quality of our lakes for which we strive.


As all of that dead plant matter starts to decay, it leeches tannins into the water, staining the water a brown color. A perfect example of this process is **Tahquamenon Falls** in Michigan, where the upstream cedar swamps leech tannins into the river, causing the water to be so brown that it has been nicknamed "The Root Beer Falls". But, with monsoon season, our streets warm up during the day, a storm rolls in during the afternoon and washes that bio-mass down to the storm drains, where it gets clogged. That mass of plant debris then acts like a tea bag, because the water is warm from the streets being radiated all day, and adds brown water to our lakes.

Of all of the dead plant debris that enters our lakes, pine

tree needles are one of the worst offenders. Australian Bottle Trees, Mesquite and other pod trees are really bad, adding debris and staining our lakes. These trees are our primary tannin leechers at Dobson Ranch. And I'm sure we've all seen oranges and other citrus fruit floating in the lakes at times.

So, what can we do to stop it? Nothing... it is a part of nature. But, we can help reduce the effect by keeping our trees trimmed and yards clean to avoid the plant debris building up in our streets and lakes. This is especially important for homes that are located right on the lakes, as their plant and shrub debris continuously drops directly into the lakes.

Another way to help mitigate the process is to invest in skimmers for our lakes, like pools have, but much larger. These have been used in ocean boat marinas and other lakes for years. The skimmer would pay for itself as crews would spend less time cleaning debris out of the lakes, since the skimmers would gather the debris to one location for clean out. It would help reduce the surface debris and resulting bio-mass to make our lakes cleaner and healthier.











The Governing Documents of Dobson Ranch

The Board recently went through an extensive review of all the various recorded covenants, conditions and restrictions (CC&Rs) that pertain to each Lot within The Dobson Association. The Board utilized the Community Manager to research

the documents and verify them with the attorney. Through the research, the Board discovered that all the subdivisions within The Dobson Association have individual sets of residential CC&Rs. However, the Board also discovered that, for the most part, the various sets of CC&Rs are very similar, if not identical. While Boards over the past several decades have only used one of the subdivisions CC&Rs (Los Altos) for reference and enforcement, the current Board wants to ensure it is enforcing the correct set of CC&Rs for each Lot. The Board does not know why this practice started

decades ago, but wants to make sure moving forward that this Board and future Boards enforce the specific restrictions that apply to each Lot. The Board will start this practice immediately.

If you have any questions regarding what set of CC&Rs pertains to your Lot or how the Board plans to implement this change moving forward, please attend the Workshop scheduled for September 23, 2019. The Community Manager will go over how to locate the CC&Rs on the website and the various subdivisions. You can also contact the Community Manager directly to assist in determining your subdivision's CC&Rs.

6.5 BOARD VACANCIES In the event of a Board vacancy resulting from a Board Member resignation, removal, or death, the Board may, at its discretion, appoint a

Qualified (Section 5.7) Dobson Association Member to fill the unexpired term.

5.7 QUALIFICATIONS Each Director: (a) shall be at least eighteen (18) years of age; (b) shall not be a paid employee of the Association; and (c) shall be a Member in Good Standing (if a Member).

The person who fills this position must be familiar with the Policies, Bylaws, CC&Rs, and other governing documents. The Board of Directors meets monthly, and as needed, for Executive Sessions.



Erasing the Wicked Stepmom Stigma

Dobson Ranch resident **Elizabeth Mosaidis, MA** was an independent professional educator in Japan, South Korea, and Puerto Rico teaching English as a second language for over 15 years. Seven years ago, she met a handsome single parent of a feisty five-year-old daughter and the rest, as they say, is history.

Elizabeth recently celebrated the 5-year milestone of her marriage and

parenting her stepdaughter who is now 12. She is the Founder of **The Stepmom Project**, a Stepfamily Certified Coach and the author of two books. Her passion is educating and empowering stepfamilies.

"I struggled as a stepmom the first year I got married, so I know how hard it can be," Elizabeth said. "I did not know any other stepfamilies at the time and could not find resources to help. I was ashamed to admit that I was not being successful in this part of my life. So, I started writing my first book entitled *The Stepmom Project: A*30-Day Personalized Journey in 2016 because it helped me process my feelings towards all of the challenges that come along with being a stepmom."

The interactive book published in 2017 (available on **Amazon** and at **Barnes & Noble**) chronicles her own journey of becoming a stepmom and offers support to other women navigating what can be a difficult, roller-coaster-ride transition into stepmotherhood.

"Being a stepmom is not a solitary journey. It is important to have a strong support system in place as the role of a

stepmom can be very isolating," she added.

"When you look through the book, the first thing you'll notice is that it is a little different. When I wrote and illustrated it, I wanted to combine my favorite aspects of reading and writing, so I meshed readings, journal-style prompts, doodles, and reflection pieces into an easily digestible 30-day format. Too often, we simply don't take the time to read, reflect and write, so I designed a book that invites stepmoms to write down their stories and reflect on their new roles in as little as 15 minutes a day. This book helps open up dialogues on stepfamily-related issues, which resonates with stepmoms."

But, beyond the book as the title suggests, *The Stepmom Project* is about creating a space where stepmothers can come together and learn from each other's experiences. She has since received hundreds of positive reviews from readers who said that her book helped change their lives. The book has also been endorsed by *StepMom Magazine*.

She went on to say, "I always envisioned **The Stepmom Project** as much more than a book," she said. "When I was writing it, I pictured a community of stepmoms working together and supporting each other to take steps to reach their goals. By goals, I mean the goals that each stepmom sets, like having a peaceful family vacation or creating a family tradition together. That's what embodies the essence of The Stepmom Project."

Elizabeth's second book **Stepmom Bootcamp: A 21-Day Challenge** was published at the beginning of this year.

"Stepmoms often feel powerless in their roles, so I wanted to empower stepmoms by giving them the tools to change their lives one step at a time. Often, it's the smallest steps that have the biggest impact over time. Through research and practice, I

designed a program that will challenge stepmoms and help transform their lives. By completing readings, daily challenges and reflections, they will experience an improvement in their stepfamily life. They will gain inner peace, greater clarity on their stepmom role, and a vision for their family life in the future," she added.

Mosaidis' mission did not stop with two books under her belt. She went to New York to train at the **Stepfamily Foundation** to become a certified coach. Plus, she went on to develop the **Stepmom Project Workshop Series** which is a two-hour program that provides the three things that every

stepmom needs: knowledge, strategies and support for navigating your stepmother role. Space in her workshops is limited to six participants. The Workshop addresses stepfamily dynamics, unrealistic expectations, discipline, roles, rules, and communication strategies. Her next Workshop will take place in Tempe on November 16. Registration can be made online at thestepmomproject.com.

Interested in learning more, but can't make the workshop? Elizabeth coaches stepfamilies one-on-one over the phone using *Skype* and *Facetime* and in person as well. She also plans to develop a new workshop series based on her second book. Thanks to Elizabeth, the "wicked stepmom" stigma is finally a thing of the past.

To celebrate, Elizabeth is teaming up with Jester'Z Improv in Mesa to hold a Stepfamily Appreciation Night on Saturday, September 14 for a fun night of laughter to honor stepfamilies. In the Zone - Tennis Tips for September

Knowing the zones on the tennis court and hitting in the correct zones with the correct shot will help determine your success as a player.

For example, if your opponent camps out on the baseline, they are giving you Zones 1 & 2 (service box) to hit into, and if they are at the net then they are giving up Zones 3 & 4 (no-mans-land).

Go out and practice hitting in different zones with a friend or use a ball machine to help sharpen your skills by placing the ball where you want it to land to outplay your opponent. By doing this, you will be playing smarter and not harder.

- 2. The entry fee will be \$10.00 per chili entered. Contestants may enter more than one batch of chili. There will be a First and Second Place Gift Card prize.
- 3. All ingredients must be pre-cooked and treated prior to the event. Chili is to be brought "ready to eat."
- 4. Contestants are responsible for supplying all of their own utensils and products relating to their chili submission and maintenance of its proper temperature for serving. Spoons and cups for use in serving chili to the general public will be
- Each contestant must cook a minimum of five (5) quarts of competition chili. Judges will be unidentified along with the general public. All chili will be for public consumption.
- 6. Each contestant will be assigned a "contestant number" by the Chief Scorekeeper and be given a container in which their chili will be collected at the time of the official judging.
- 7. The decision of the judges is final. Judging will be based on score cards which are numbered. 80% of the final tally will be from the judge's score cards. 20% will be score cards from "people's choice."

8. Each contestant is responsible for policing and cleaning up the area at the end of the day and removing all items from the area. No items shall be allowed to remain after the close of the Cook-Off.

Judging

In this competition the chili will be blind judged (no one knows the identity of the cook) and score cards will be based on the following six characteristics:

- 1. Texture: The texture of the meat shall not be tough or mushy.
- 2. Flavor: The chili should have good flavoring and chili pepper taste (not too hot or too mild).
- 3. Consistency: Chili should be a smooth combination of meat and gravy (not too thin or too thick).
- Spice and Taste: Blending of the spices and how well they have permeated the meat.
- 5. Aroma: This will be a personal preference of the judge.
- 6. Color: The submitted chili should look appetizing.

There will be a People's Choice ballot box for people to score the chili. Score cards will be collected and tallied at the end of the judging, and that score will be added to the final tally.

Dobson Ranch Recreation will provide the cups and spoons for chili samples and the container for competition chili submission.







How Mesa Public Schools Keep Students Safe

MPS takes a multipronged approach to student and staff safety by focusing on relationships and social and emotional wellness.



Developing impactful relationships

On secondary school campuses, School Resource Officers have kept students safe for more than 20 years. These fully-sworn law enforcement officers are a liaison between the school and police community. They keep order on campus and build relationships within the community.

An assigned SRO is present on every high school campus and most junior high campuses. SROs work for the police department and are reimbursed by the district. A state grant pays for the majority of SRO costs.

"The greatest benefit of having security officers on school campuses is building bridges between students and police," says Allen Moore, Director of School Safety and Security at Mesa Public Schools.

Student-officer relationships are key to helping at-risk students. They are the eyes and ears patrolling campuses to prevent criminal activity. In the classroom, SROs educate students about various subjects, including the serious consequences of drug abuse, drinking, vaping, violence, and bullying.

"SROs foster an environment where students and parents feel comfortable approaching and speaking with the police," says Greg Milbrandt, Mountain View High Principal. "Many times, sensitive information is shared that may not have been before, giving officers the opportunity to be preventative, instead of reactive."

Strategies for creating safe schools

CARE (Crisis and Response Evaluation) teams implemented in the 2019-20 school year provide schools with the tools, support and compassion needed during stressful events.

According to Dr. Michael Garcia, Director of Opportunity and Achievement, each school's CARE team comprises principals, counselors, nurses, and related professionals. Team members are trained to handle difficult and sensitive situations on a campus including minor altercations, bullying incidents, the loss of a student or staff member, or students at risk of self-harm. Should schools need additional support, a district CARE team is available to assist.

Helpful resources for parents and community

In 2019-20, 35 counselors have been added to district elementary schools. All K-12 district counselors support the academic and social and emotional needs of students and the community by implementing the American School Counselor Association national model.

Access to mental health resources are available on the district website, including suicide prevention. Find additional help at mpsaz.org/opportunity.

"What's great about these resources is that they are 24/7, so anyone can call at any time," Garcia says.

also available. And, as a NFLL member, you'll get an MCC student ID card which gives you discounts on campus and in the community.









Begin your cruise by carefully boarding our pontoon boat with plush couch-style seating and a bimini top for shade. The bimini top is a huge convenience to shade the strong Arizona sun. However, the bimini top covers a portion, but not all, of the boat, so it is recommended that you bring sun hats, sunglasses and wear sunblock just in case. Children age 12 and under are required to wear life jackets at all times. Life jackets will be provided for you, if needed. Please note that there is no smoking, pets or fishing allowed during your cruise. See below for other restrictions that may apply.

Once you set sail, you will want to keep your eyes open as you glide across the water so you don't miss any of the water fowl. And, be sure to look up! You will likely spot several different species of birds that nest along our shores.

Don't forget your camera! Cameras and phones are allowed and encouraged. You'll want to make the memories last long after you disembark from your cruise.


- COMPLIMENTARY PONTOON RIDE A one-time free Pontoon Boat ride per property is available to Dobson Ranch residents each year.
- 2. AVAILABLE TO DOBSON RANCH RESIDENTS ONLY -

Rental and usage of the Dobson Ranch Pontoon Boat is available only to residents in good standing. Residents signing the agreement must reside in Dobson Ranch at the time of the pontoon ride. A copy the Declarations page of Homeowner's Insurance or Renter's Insurance is due when signing the rental agreement.

- 3. SCHEDULING Cruises are scheduled according to staff availability.
- 4. **RENTAL FEES** The pontoon rental fee is \$35.00 per hour with a two-hour maximum.
- 5. RESERVATIONS Reservations require a 7-day advance notice and are subject to staff availability. Payments for reservations, which are cancelled less than 72 hours prior to the reservation date, will be forfeited. Management reserves the right to cancel any reservation if misrepresented in any way or due to circumstances beyond its control including, but not limited to, weather conditions, mechanical problems, or staff unavailability.
- REFUNDS At ALL times, cruises are governed by weather conditions such as wind, rain, and lightning. In these instances, a full refund will be provided.
