Most Common Questions Answered

I receive many inquiries from the "Contact Us" form on the website. I thought I would answer a few common questions in my article this month.

Do I have to submit an architectural review for my project?This question gets asked for things like roofs, landscape, paint, and other various projects. The answer is normally yes. However,

it is usually an easy process. The Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee has delegated some approvals to the office. Those are replacing roofs, painting your house with an approved color, replacing windows and solar panels. You will still need to submit an application, and that can be found on our website under Documents and Forms. Larger projects such as sheds, additions and other permanent structures will need the approval of the DRAC. They meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month.

I received a violation letter, and I do not believe I have a violation. On occasion, a resident will get a letter from our office pointing out an issue we believe is in violation of the governing documents. We typically issue a "Friendly Reminder" first. We don't start with a violation since residents are not often aware that they are in violation of our governing documents. We want to give residents the benefit of the doubt and time to correct anything that may be elevated to a violation. And, on occasion, we are wrong. Our "Friendly Reminder" acknowledges that we can be wrong about a seeming violation. If you do get a letter of any kind from our office, please call our office and we are happy to work with you on whatever the issue is... even if it is a profuse apology.

Where is my statement? I have not received my coupon book! What are our annual assessments? I was set up on autopay and payments have not come out of my bank account. As of January 2020, The Dobson Association, Inc. sends out our quarterly statements. You should have received yours recently in the mail. We stopped sending coupon books in 2019, due to a relatively new law that requires us to send statements. The annual assessments are \$552.00. In June 2020, we switched banks from Washington Federal to CIT. If you had your assessments on autopay, you would need to update your payments with CIT. Water Awareness

Water Quality

Recently the City of Mesa mailed a flyer to each homeowner reporting on the current water quality inspection made on the drinking water we

consume. When you turn on your tap, you want to know the water is clean and safe. Since the founding of Dobson Ranch, the City of Mesa has been providing water that meets more than 100 state and federal drinking water standards to provide clean and safe water.

As discussed in a previous article, water is ubiquitous, it is everywhere. Been there, done that tends to pick up a lot of baggage and in the world of water quality that baggage is called contamination. Some contamination presents no problems for our households, but some contaminates are bad for our health. Some contaminates are from natural sources while others are byproducts of our daily lives. Lead, copper and arsenic can be traced to the ground through which the water flows before it enters our drinking water supply. Other chemicals, like Trichloroethylene (a solvent) or Dibromochloropropane (a pesticide) enter the drinking water supply as run-off from spills and other contaminated locations. Microbial contaminants, like bacteria and viruses, can be washed out of contaminated soil near agricultural operations (farms). The list goes on.

How do we deal with these and other baggage that gets picked up by water before it enters our water supply? One way is to buy bottled water. That, however, creates more problems than it solves. Bottled water must meet the same standards as tap water, only it is delivered in plastic cylinders that are a contaminant themselves, maybe not to us directly, but to some part of nature. The other way is to insure the City of Mesa continues to provide safe and clean drinking water, which it has been doing for over 100 years.

The City of Mesa relies on three sources for our drinking water: the Salt and Verdi Rivers, the Colorado River and ground water pumped from 34 wells around Mesa. In 2011, 49% of the potable water supplied to our area came from the Colorado River via

the CAP canal, 45% came from the Salt River Project system and 6% came from the City of Mesa wells. One of these wells is located on the Dobson Ranch Golf Course.

Tests are routinely conducted to monitor for the presence of these elements and measures taken to limit their concentrations. Removing them from our drinking water is an effort and expense. Wasting water negates all that effort, effort we pay the City of Mesa to perform. Remember, clean water is abundant to those that use it wisely.





Spring Is in the Air!

Now that we are slowly moving into warmer weather, many homeowners are looking to get started on home projects such as house painting, landscape work and tree planting. Before starting any home project, please make sure to refer to your **Dobson Ranch Residential Architectural Guidelines.** Here is

where you will find Dobson Ranch's Architectural rules and what is and is not allowed. Homeowners can find both the Residential Architectural Guidelines and the Architectural Application on the Dobson Ranch website.

Painting - All colors for exterior surfaces must be taken from the Dobson Ranch Color Code, which shall consist of a color palette range. This color range includes base and trim colors and can be found on the Dobson Ranch website. Any repainting, redecorating or other change of an exterior surface will require prior written approval from the DRAC. Exterior paint should be maintained and/or repainted when the existing paint has deteriorated.

Landscape - All visible yard areas shall be landscaped.
Landscaping may consist of grass, trees, plants, shrubs,
decorative stone, artificial turf, or other materials approved
by the DRAC. Exposed dirt is not an approved landscape

material. All landscaping projects need to be approved by the DRAC committee. When filling out the Architectural Application for landscaping, please remember to review the check list attached to the sheet and be as detailed as possible with pictures, sketches, what type of plants and location, and size and color of pavers.

Trees - All Dobson Ranch front yards shall have and maintain a minimum of one live tree (15-gallon size or larger) and two live shrubs (5-gallon size or larger) and must be permanently planted in the ground. Due to the lack of rain Arizona has had last year and so far this year, there are many dead trees throughout the neighborhood. Luckily, with the help of the SRP Free Shade Tree Program, many Dobson Ranch homeowners were able to get free trees to replace their dead ones. Please remember to maintain trees by trimming or removing dead branches.

Please remember when filling out the Architectural Application to be as DETAILED as possible. This will help the DRAC make an informed decision. When applications are not filled out correctly or have missing information, it can stall the approval process. If you have any questions regarding filling out the applications, please feel free to contact the main office and I would be happy to assist you.

Do Cats Need to Roam Outside?

We have a short quiz for you cat fanciers. Answer true or false to each statement below:

- 1. Cats need some "outdoor time" when they can roam free.
- 2. Cats that roam freely outside live shorter lives than those that live indoors.
- 3. Cats that roam freely outside don't present a significant nuisance to others.

The first and third questions are false and the second is true. Often people let their cats roam freely in the neighborhood because they think that their cats need some outside time. There is no evidence that cats "need" to roam freely outside. They are not harmed physically or behaviorally if they do not get outside. Certainly there are some cats that are very persistent about wanting to go outside, especially those that have been outside cats in the past. They can meow, howl, pester and try to dash out the door or even try to break out of windows. This can be distressing to owners and sometimes the easiest way to deal with such pesky pets is to just let them out. This is not a good idea because it shortens the lives of cats to be allowed to roam freely outside. They can be injured in fights with other cats, by dogs and wild animals such as coyotes, owls, snakes, scorpions and bobcats. Or they may be killed by cars and trucks and subject to diseases from other animals or carcinogenic chemicals like pesticides.

Cats that roam freely can also become a significant nuisance to the community by eliminating in neighboring gardens and yards, by digging up plants, killing wild birds and small animals, getting into fights with neighbor cats, and clawing outdoor furniture cushions, and, if they are not spayed or neutered, by reproducing and often leaving kittens that end up in shelters. Roaming cats can also harass indoor cats by threatening them, attacking them through windows and doors and by spraying the outside of neighboring houses. Such harassment can lead the indoor cats to spray, fight with other indoor cats or even attack their owners.

If you have an outdoor cat, the best thing you can do for your pet is to bring the cat inside and make her an indoor cat. If your indoor cat wants to go outside, try to distract the cat with play or attention when it gets pesky. If this doesn't help, try putting your cat on a time-out away from the doors until it has quieted down. Try to enrich her environment with toys, things to climb and things to scratch. If these things don't work and you feel you need to give the cat some outside time, either build an outside cage, where the cat can be outside but safe, or cat-proof your backyard so the cat cannot escape and let her out back when she wants out. If these things are not feasible, consider putting your cat on a harness and leash and taking her outside under supervision.

Tips for Hard Pruning Shrubs

Rejuvenation and renovation (or renewal) pruning are forms or techniques of hard pruning. These extreme methods of pruning shrubs can restore vigor to old, neglected, overgrown or misshapen shrubs. These techniques involve cutting some shrubs to the ground or leaving only 6 to 12 inches of stubs. While drastic, if done properly, the result is like replacing old shrubs with new ones.

Renovation or renewal pruning: Removal of old stems or canes over a period of three years with 1/3 of the oldest stems removed each year. It is best done during the dormant season, right before new growth begins in the spring. This results in a more vigorous shrub, and, in the case of flowering ornamentals, better flowering.

- In early spring, remove 1/3 of the stems, cutting them all the way to the ground or main trunk. Cut side branches back by 1/3.
- In the second year, cut 1/2 of the remaining old wood, and
- In the third year, remove all remaining old wood.
- As you thin the shrub and the sun begins to penetrate to the center, new growth replaces the branches you have removed. Most of our shrubs respond well to this method.

Rejuvenation pruning: Removal of all the stems or canes to ground level or up to 12 inches at one time and allowing the shrub to regrow. In mid-summer, about 1/2of stems should be removed and the remaining ones cut back to different heights. The advantage of this type of pruning is that the shrub recovers quickly. The disadvantages of this type of pruning are that not all shrubs tolerate drastic cutting, and, until the plant regrows, you are left with an unsightly stub.

Recommended shrubs for rejuvenation pruning: Leucophyllum, Xylosma, Oleander, Hopbush, Creosote, Brittle Bush, Lantana, Autumn Sage, Mexican Honeysuckle, and Red Bird of Paradise.

These methods are not appropriate for all shrubs. They work best with shrubs that consist of several stems arising directly from the ground. Shrubs with tree-like growth consisting of one main stem with several side branches are difficult to renew by this method. Cassias, Arborvitae, Junipers and Rosemary do not respond well and may die. A third, less drastic option is to prune all the stems or canes to unequal heights in one season. Pruning by shearing will not correct the issues with old shrubs.



Supporting Young Learners Using Al

Currently, I am working on my PhD in Psychology with a focus on the psychological and emotional impacts of implementing technology in education. I expect to complete this program in late 2023.

Q: What is your family status?

BS: I married my lovely wife, Jill, in 2005, and we have three children – Chloe (18), Cadence (13) and Broderick (11). While we have only lived in the Ranch since 2017, we've spent 12 years in a home in Dobson Woods (the neighborhood behind Walgreens on Alma School and Guadalupe).

Q: How long have you served on the Board of Directors? When did you become Vice President?

BS: I have served on the Dobson Ranch Board for almost two years after being elected in the spring of 2019. I became Vice President in the spring of 2020.

Q: Why did you run for the Board of Directors? What recent achievements of the Board are you most proud of and why?

BS: I ran for the Board because I wanted to ensure that Dobson Ranch continues to be the amazing family-friendly neighborhood I fell in love with so many years ago. I am most proud of the renewed focus on our beautiful lakes, the shade cover for the playground at Laguna Park, and the ongoing support of the family-friendly events that our Recreation Team hosts. These are the things that make Dobson Ranch the best place to live. I am also tremendously proud of the work the entire staff has done to innovate and think outside the box to engage our community in safe ways during the COVID quarantine period.

Q: Tell us about your role as CEO of Gnosis IQ. What does the word "Gnosis" mean?

BS: I am the Founder and CEO of Gnosis IQ. While the company was not officially formed until July of 2020 as a "COVID Company," the concept dates to an idea I had in early 2015. The idea was to program an Artificial Intelligence engine with an algorithm I wrote that analyzes several variables to predict academic weakness for K-12 learners. I also wanted to develop a tool that would remove the social stigma of asking for help and allow the students to self-report their emotional state.

The word "Gnosis" is Greek for the word "Knowledge." My team and I chose that name because our tools empower users with the knowledge they need to make informed decisions to support young learners and promote their success.

While the number of people who work for the company fluctuates based on need, the core team consists of between five and 10 people, and currently employs six people.

Q: Tell us about your new software in layman's terms?

BS: The software has been in development since spring 2020 and is based on an algorithm I wrote in early 2015. It has two core functions. The primary function is to automatically pull and analyze learning data to predict when, where and how students will struggle academically. This information is displayed graphically on a dashboard for all stakeholders including students, parents, teachers, school administrators and district administrators. This information allows the students to see what they need to focus on and empowers teachers by helping them develop intervention plans for students before they fall behind.

The secondary function of the **Gnosis IQ** application allows students the opportunity to self-report their emotional health in a fun way that eliminates the social stigma associated with asking for help. When students report "risk" emotions, alerts are automatically sent to a configurable group of people that generally include the teacher, counselor and principal. However, we have cases where parents, case workers, and even the superintendent are notified. When notified, the users can log into **Gnosis IQ** and see a timeline of reported emotions along with their current and predictive academic data. The combination of this information allows the users to understand what was happening with the student and helps to guide the conversation to support the student. With **Gnosis IQ** tools, help is a click away!

Spring Fish Stock

With another summer rapidly approaching, we find ourselves in the midst of spring. Those of us who have lived in the valley through multiple summers know that spring never lasts as long as we'd like it to, and while the rest of the country anxiously awaits warmer weather, we wish there

was someway to pump the breaks on the soon to be ever-rising daily (and let's be honest... evening) temps!

With spring comes our **Spring Fish Stock**, this year's stocking took place on March 19th. Fisheries have mostly recovered from the effects of Covid-19. Yes, they had Covid, too! Supplies have been renewed and we are excited to get full orders of quality fish. The spring order is where we add Minnows, Readear Sunfish, Bluegill and Catfish. These fish species are our aquatic workers and provide forage for larger fish.

This season's order consists of 2,200 Redear Sunfish, approximately 3,600 Bluegill, 1,775 catfish and 25,000 Fathead Minnows. The Redear Sunfish are one of the few fish species that will actively feed on mussels including the dreaded

quagga mussel. The Bluegill feed on insect larva, flying insects, zooplankton and smaller fish, while catfish eat mostly fish and insects which have died and are lying on the bottom of the lakebed, (think of them as the cleaners of the lakebed). The Fathead Minnows are particularly hard workers, in that they eat algae, organic sediment, duck and goose waste, leaf litter and mosquito larva. These guys work 24/7!

Along with the fish stocking, another set of artificial fish habitats will be placed in Lake 1, east of the bridge. This new habitat will provide cover for smaller fish and provide a place for multiple fish species to lay their eggs, which in turn will help add to our fish stock and create a more stable ecosystem within our lakes. More habitat is planned for future placements throughout the lakes here at the Ranch.

As always, remember to "Catch and Release." That goes for all our fish here at the Ranch. Resident and non-resident fishing licenses are available at the Recreation Center. You can also submit photos of your catch to *Ranchers' RoundUp* for a chance to be featured in a future publication.

Tennis Tip for April: Anticipation Skills

Anticipation

Remember the song, **Anticipation**, from singer/songwriter Carly Simon released in the

early '70s? Anticipation means to be prepared for, look forward to, and the action of expecting or predicting something to happen.

One of the key abilities of good tennis players is anticipation. It's an ability to predict with very high probability what the opponent will play. The player anticipates their opponent's shot and moves before the opponent even plays the ball.

For example, if you do a short drop shot, then you should move up as your opponent is trying to chase it down to end the point. Or, if you lob the player at the net, and they are running back to retrieve the ball, then you should be moving toward the net as they are running away from the net to end the point rather than standing and watching.

The most common act is when you send the ball close to your opponent's body or at their feet to ANTICIPATE a weaker reply back, rather than standing far back on the baseline, and now you have to run down that weaker reply that doesn't reach you because you did not perform anticipation.

Tips for Developing Anticipation Skills

You can practice developing anticipation skills at any time -- while watching a game or practice -- even if you're not playing.

- **1. Identify your target:** Identify the target whose movement you want to anticipate. This could be the ball or an opposing player.
- 2. Establish spatial awareness relative to your target: Be aware of where your target is relative to where you are positioned and where you are moving to.
- **3. Identify likely movements:** Quickly think of what movements are most likely in the situation and by this player.
- **4. Look for the earliest "committed" movement cue:** Watch for the instant the target commits to his move and respond immediately to the target's direction.
- **5. Visualize:** Immediately after the play, visualize the movements and cues that just took place and what the final committed movement was. You will store this information in your brain and continue to build experience each time you do it.







Health and fitness expert Chris Powell partnered with Mesa Public Schools, City of Mesa and Mesa Chamber of Commerce to bring his Move One Million nonprofit to Mesa. The goal is to use movement as a pathway to boost positive behaviors in the classroom, while looking to the future of our community.

According to **Marlo Loria**, director of career & technical education and innovative partnerships, the district is committed to safety and well-being practices that are evidence-based and embedded throughout the district.

"Students can't learn or reach their full potential without meeting their mental and physical needs first," Loria says. "Chris Powell has spent the past 20 years transforming people's lives. *Move One Million* provides a powerful tool to help the district meet our respective goals, and bring students, staff and the community together through movement."

Move One Mesa encourages employees and students to participate in a special synchronized routine together. The 2.5-minute routine also includes an adapted version for individuals with limited movement. It increases learning and improves health by reducing stress, boosting blood and oxygen flow, and creating a sense of accomplishment. The daily

movement resources are provided free to the district and based on *Rajio Taiso*, the Japanese radio calisthenics program. Video routines feature guest hosts, including Powell and six-time Olympic gold medalist **Amy VanDyken**.

The kickoff featured Superintendent **Andi Fourlis**, Mesa Mayor **John Giles**, Powell, community leaders and educators on top of Brown Mountain. The weeklong initiative focused on daily priorities that included physical health, mental health, #MesaK-indness and community service.

Fourlis says Mesa Public Schools enjoys working with community partners that are important to creating comprehensive healthy schools and communities.



"The results are evident in district programming that includes nationally recognized physical education, recess activities, healthy nutrition, classroom movement

breaks, and counselors who address the social and emotional needs of students," Fourlis says. "Around the community, the City of Mesa is improving parks and sidewalks, and building bike trails to support the whole child and needs of the community."

Q: How did you get involved with Artificial Intelligence software? What sparked your interest?

BS: I started working with Artificial Intelligence in the early 2000s when I wrote an adaptive learning model for online education. The system would analyze the performance of the student and assign them lessons in the course that supported their weaknesses and was based on homework and test scores within the system itself. It was cutting edge at the time, but would be considered rudimentary by today's standards. While the computing power was nothing like it is now, the system proved effective and is actually still in use today. I got interested in Al while trying to figure out how to better support struggling learners.

Q: What makes your software so unique?

BS: The Gnosis IQ software is the only automatic (no data entry required) educational predictive reporting tool that empowers all stakeholders. There are other reporting tools on the market, but they are complicated, don't offer AI, and only allow a hand-full of users per school or district. We also use a proprietary 10-point performance scale that is color-coded and easy to read. Finally, we offer the only integrated emotional self-reporting tool in education. The tool is available through the Gnosis IQ software and is also directly integrated into the web browser!

Q: What is the targeted market for your software product?

BS: The software is designed to be sold to schools and school districts. However, when purchased, all stakeholders get access. Students can see their own records, parents can see their kids, teachers can see their kids, principals (and other school administrators) can see their kids, and District Leaders can see all the data for all the kids in their district. While we have sales teams outside of Arizona, we are focused on supporting Arizona children first.

Early results show a decrease in teacher "Admin Time" because the **Gnosis IQ** software processes and displays the critical data that teachers need. One educator reported that it saves him 8-10 hours per week. Students are also already seeing the benefits by receiving targeted lessons to support where the system predicts weakness and performance is increasing at a measurable rate! The emotional tool was just launched, so we're actively monitoring the benefits that system offers.

Q: Which school districts are currently using the software? What has their reaction been to the data provided by the software? What other school districts are interested in testing the software?

BS: Currently, the only district using the software is Isaac Elementary School District in Phoenix. However, we have at least a dozen other Arizona school districts with which we are in active conversation. The feedback that we received from Isaac has been nothing short of inspiring. The last time I met with the Superintendent, Dr. Mario Ventura, he told me about how they were able to identify everything from academic weaknesses to inconsistencies in recording grades. This empowered him to coach his staff through correcting the problems and gave the educators direction on future lessons. The students also love the ability to share how they are feeling.

Q: Since the KTAR and CBS5/TV3 interviews, have you had any new interest from other school districts in the state of Arizona?



BS: Since the television interviews aired on February 24, we have received a tremendous amount of interest from schools and districts through-

out the state of Arizona. We are also in talks with a large Arizona university about leveraging doctoral students to analyze and expand our current scope of reporting to include Title 1 performance data. (Title 1 is a classification of students whose families classify at the federal level as socioeconomically disadvantaged.) The goal is to be able to offer schools and educators with current and future academic performance data, so they can make targeted decisions about the programs and services they offer that population to ensure the greatest benefit

Q: Are there any specific goals that you have set in 2021 for Gnosis IQ? How do you plan to meet them?

BS: At **Gnosis IQ**, we're always looking to innovate. However, since we spent 2020 building out the system, our goal for 2021 is growth. We currently support about 7,700 students and would like to support over 100,000 students by the end of the calendar year.

Q: Please tell us something that most people do not know about you.

BS: Most people don't know that I was once featured on the **History Channel** show, *American Restoration!* I was in Season 4, Episode 3 in a show entitled "Harleys and Horsies." I had my 1970s Harley Davidson Golf Cart restored. The episode still airs occasionally, and it's fun to get the calls/texts from friends who didn't know that I did the show when they see me on it.




