Message From the Association President

Happy July!

The world is back in business, kids are out of school, and it's blazing hot. Oh well, I guess two out of three ain't bad!

June was another busy month for the Board. We held a joint workshop with our **Budget and Finance Committee** to discuss potentially outsourcing our Accounting and Bookkeeping positions. Our combined emphasis is to ensure the sustainability of the Ranch's finances, as well as enabling the best possible service for our Association's Members. After further discussion and review of four different options, the Board voted to move forward and collaborate with a third-party Accounting Services provider. This will reduce the cost burden to the Association, allow for better continuity, and provide stronger oversight of the Association's finances.

The Board also greenlighted updating our monument signage throughout the Ranch. After many years, it's time for a refresh. We reviewed several design proposals, and with the assistance of our **Master Planning Committee**, we selected a design aesthetic that best suits the Ranch. The Board also approved engaging with an architect to come up with plans for renovating the Saratoga recreation facility.

Finally, the Board unanimously approved a motion to have our attorney draft restated CC&Rs. This is a first step to help alleviate a major challenge that the Ranch has dealt with since day one. Some background - even though Dobson Ranch is one master planned community, we're comprised of over thirty separate subdivisions, not including our eleven sub-associations. Each subdivision has its own unique set of CC&Rs, which means that lot use restrictions and architectural requirements vary between subdivisions. For example, some of the lots in Dobson Ranch are limited to having only two-car garages, while others have no specific limit. This creates challenges for residents who may wish to update their homes, and for our **Dobson Ranch** Architectural Committee (DRAC) who are required to navigate the requirements for approving architectural applications for each subdivision. It also complicates the CC&R enforcement process. The solution is to consolidate all of the Dobson Ranch subdivisions under one consistent set of CC&Rs.

To be clear, our intent is not to make dramatic changes to the Association's regulatory framework. Restating CC&Rs won't be a quick or simple process; nor should it be. Members of each subdivision will need to vote individually to ratify the new CC&Rs. Depending on their existing documents, some of them can do this by simple majority, while others require 75% or greater in favor to approve. Extensive community outreach will be necessary, and this will be a year-long process. It's worth the effort to set aside the outdated requirements and ensure the sustainability of our Association for the future. There will be many opportunities for the community to provide feedback. Stay tuned for updates as this process moves along.

The Added Benefits of a Third-Party Accounting Firm

As Allen mentioned in his message, we will be working with a third-party accounting company. I wanted to elaborate on some of the additional benefits to the operation of Dobson Ranch.

Uniform and consistent financial reporting: With a third-party accounting company, we will receive consistent and uniform financial reporting. We will also have the option of ad hoc reports if there is an area of interest or concern.

Separation of duties and internal controls: With our new accounting services, we will strengthen our internal controls with layers of approval, clear separation of duties and improved internal controls. Board oversight will continue with Board approval on invoices by the President and Treasurer. All Board members will have full access to all invoices paid as well as access to financial reports.

In addition to the robust financial reporting and financial transparency, additional services will benefit the overall operations of Dobson Ranch.

One additional benefit is **new code enforcement software**. Staff will have a more user-friendly platform to enforce CCR compliance. The new platform will have accurate reporting and improved tracking of violations.

We will be making ordering resale documents an easier process. Realtors, banks and title companies will be able to go to our website to download disclosures pertinent to the closing of an escrow.

It is important to know that we are still here in the office, and we are retaining all current staff. If you want to drop off a payment in the office, you can. If you want to come to the office to ask a question about your account, we are here to help.

Transitioning to a third-party accounting company will take time. Full transition will take a few months. We have a comprehensive transition plan and will keep you up-to-date on any pertinent information along the way. Keep Palm Trees Trimmed






DESERT LANDSCAPING

Pantry Pests and Summer Heat by Sue Hakala, Certified Volunteer Master Gardener



Inside the House...

Insects move indoors during the hottest part of the summer. There are a host of pests that would enjoy a meal in your pantry: bean weevil, rice weevil, flour beetle, grain beetle, Indian meal moth, roach, ant, firebrat, etc. Some are specific feeders, meaning that they will eat just specific things such as grains or pasta. Others are general feeders that aren't fussy at all.


Keeping a clean cabinet helps prevent their visits. Vacuum out crumbs in corners and cracks, thoroughly wipe everything else down. Store food in glass, metal or heavy plastic containers that have tight, insect-proof lids to keep insects out of your food. Cardboard, cellophane, metal foils, and flexible plastics are not barriers for most pantry pests in larvae or adult stages. Check new food purchases for pests before you store them. I once found cockroaches in dried cat food. Watch out for little spills, they make a meal for a bug.

Pantry pests generally found in food products will not harm humans or animals. Place food in the freezer at 32° F or lower for 4-5 days or in the oven at 140° F for 30 minutes to kill any insects.

Meanwhile Outside the House...

Be sure to keep deep watering your landscape plants. Water all the way around your plants for at least one hour several feet away from your trees, bushes, flowers, cactus, and succulents. Yes, cactus too. High temperatures and no rain means that they need your attention more desperately than ever.

It's easy to forget how hot pots can get when they're in the full sun in the summer; up to 128° F or more on the sunny side of the pot. It's not a bad idea to try to insulate pots by double potting or otherwise shielding them from the direct sun. Or, use two layers of burlap or shade cloth around the pots. Secure with string or a clothespin.

Resident QEA With Councilmember Heredia

We are honored to have **Councilmember Francisco Heredia** as our "Mover and Shaker" this month answering questions sent in by our residents and Executive Director **Lynelle Glysson** in this Q&A-style interview.

Q: We have noticed an increase in homeless people walking through our neighborhood. What are your plans to keep our neighborhood family friendly and child

centric? (Question sent in by Anna Cameron.)

FH: All Valley cities have reported an increase in homelessness and/or increased community concern about seeing more homeless people on the streets. The COVID-19 pandemic and associated unemployment appears to be contributing to the number of people experiencing homelessness locally and nationally.

Addressing homelessness has become a priority for me, and for my colleagues at the Mesa City Council. As a result, we have launched various initiatives to address homelessness such as operation "Off the Streets," community court, hiring navigators through non-profit organizations, among others. Besides our citywide efforts, we are exploring partnerships at a regional level to find the solution that can best address this problem. Please know that I continue to work hard in finding creative solutions to address this, and other issues, currently present within our city.

Q: The noise along Route 101 decreases our ability to enjoy our backyard as it is too loud to talk comfortably, whereas before the freeway re-structure we had our windows open often to enjoy our AZ weather. What are your plans for keeping the AZ Department of Transportation focused on solving this issue, instead of taking the easier, less expensive option of using a louder pavement? (Question sent in by Anna Cameron.)

FH: After many conversations with residents along the 101-Price Freeway corridor regarding an increase in noise complaints following recent construction, the City of Mesa, along with the cities of Tempe and Chandler, asked the Maricopa Association of Governments to conduct an independent noise study to better understand the causes of the increase in disturbances. That study is currently underway and is scheduled to be completed by December of this year. The study will involve an extensive variety of noise measurements, including readings directly from residents' homes. After the study concludes, Maricopa Association of Governments and City of Mesa staff will review the results to determine the best next steps to address future noise concerns.

Q: I frequently ride my bicycle along the Western Canal, which is the boundary between Mesa & Chandler. This is a very

popular area for bikers and pedestrian traffic. The Chandler side has been significantly improved, with paved path, landscaping, lights, rest areas, and even water fountains. The Mesa side is a mess, with a mishmash of fences and walls, piles of trash, and yards which should be code violations. We don't need duplicate paved paths. I realize some of this area is probably SRP property, but can't something be done to improve this area, especially between Country Club and Dobson? This is the gateway to Mesa, and currently presents a very poor image. (Question sent in by Frank Mizner).

FH: The north "Mesa-side" portion of the Western Canal, from L101 to Country Club, is owned/maintained by SRP. City of Mesa staff has contacted them and reported the situation. We hope to work with them to have this resolved soon. Regarding the fencing, walls and yard condition, that is up to the property owners to maintain. Our Code Compliance Department is currently looking at the fencing conditions along the canal between Country Club and Dobson. This is a two-mile stretch and depending on the severity of the problem, it might become a long-term project. I can have more information on a plan to address this situation in the upcoming weeks. As we continue to work towards this project, we will continue to monitor the area and if you have any feedback, we would like to know.

Q: I have concerns regarding the maintenance of the sidewalks/parkways on the Ranch. Specifically, there are weeds that are about 2 feet high growing out of the sidewalk near the construction site at Dobson & Isabella. There has also been a significant amount of trash along the sidewalks on Baseline between Longmore and Pennington. Not only are there old food containers and used, dirty masks, there has been a dead bird there for a couple of weeks. I'm not knowledgeable as to the frequency of cleanup - or which organization is responsible. What can be done? (Question sent in by Tracy Pastore.)

FH: Our Transportation Department oversees streets maintenance. However, sometimes these types of issues fall into property owners' responsibility, depending on the specific location. My office has coordinated with the Transportation Department and Code Compliance to address your concerns. When in doubt, please submit a request for service and our staff will route it to the responsible party. It is a great help when residents report any issues or concerns, and the best way to report maintenance issues is through the City of Mesa **CityLink Online System:** *citylink.mesaaz.gov.* This is a user-friendly platform where residents have the ability to:

- Submit issues, and attach photos, either via the web portal or a mobile app.
- View the status of their request.
- View the location and status of other requests.

This system can be used to submit a wide variety of requests: street maintenance, graffiti, code compliance, water issues, deceased animals, etc. Through this system, City of Mesa staff can efficiently route the request to the appropriate depart-

ment in a timely manner. I encourage you to visit this website and find how useful it can be. That said, if you find that your issues are not being resolved, please feel free to reach out to my office, and I will gladly coordinate with the appropriate departments to address your concerns.

Q: What is the process for reporting City Code violations?

FH: As mentioned previously, the best way residents can report any code compliance violations is through the City of Mesa CityLink Online System: citylink.mesaaz.gov. Residents can also report issues via phone by contacting the Development Services Department Call Center at 480-644-4273 or by email. Each area is assigned a Code Compliance Officer. This website has important information regarding the code compliance officer assigned to your area. You can find contact info and an interactive map that will give you a lot of useful information: www.mesaaz.gov/residents/code-compliance/code-compliance-staff.

Q: Are there any plans to review bringing back more recycling options in the city of Mesa?

FH: Recycling remains a high priority for the City of Mesa. Unfortunately, our Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) vendor that experienced a fire in October 2019 continues to remain offline. While we are delivering as much recyclable material as possible to our remaining MRF vendor, there are currently no other viable private MRF options available at this time. Therefore, our focus remains on exploring long-term, sustainable recycling solutions. We are working with our engineering department on creating a solid waste and recycling master plan. We appreciate your patience and remind residents that while recycling does conserve natural resources, we can make much more significant gains in managing our waste stream by reducing and reusing. Simple behavioral changes, such as minimizing the use of single-serving and single-use packaging, can reduce the amount of resources and energy required to produce, transport and dispose of those items at the end of their short life cycle.

As we continue to explore long-term options, I would like to remind you about the items currently accepted in our recycling program:

- Beverage Bottles, Jugs and Cans (Water, soda, juice bottles, beer and wine bottles, aluminum soda cans, and milk jugs.)
- Metal Food Cans (Soup cans, vegetable cans, canned fruit cans, pet food cans, etc.)
- Cardboard (Corrugated cardboard only, which has a wavy center layer.)
- Paper (Mail & junk mail, office paper, magazines, newspaper.)

Q: Tell us about the Non-Discrimination Ordinance that the City Council has passed. At what stage is this ordinance?

FH: On March 1, 2021, the Mesa City Council approved a non-discrimination ordinance prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing and places of public accommodation based on race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, veteran's status, marital status, genetic information, or familial status. The new ordinance took effect on June 29, 2021. In efforts to educate our community, we have planned for an extensive outreach campaign with an educational approach which includes creating informational content that will be listed on the website, educational flyers specifically for businesses, and targeting that business education over the summer with several of our City partner organizations.

Q: What are some new projects that are underway in District 3?

FH: NW Corner of Alma School and Southern:

The Landing at Fiesta Village will consist of 220 market rate apartments with 1-3 bedroom units, amenities, and a much-improved pedestrian environment with new retail offerings along Southern. Existing buildings have been demolished and construction is anticipated to be complete in September 2022.

NW Corner of Dobson and Isabella:

The Broadstone Dobson Ranch plans for a luxury multi-family community with approximately 288 units. Construction began in the Fall of 2020 and has recently completed demolition and mass grading of the 10-acre site. Building foundations and vertical construction are currently underway, with an anticipated opening in the Spring of 2022.

SW Corner of Main and Dobson:

Mekong 88 is an expansion of the existing marketplace. This will be 32,670 square feet of new construction on a currently vacant 2.44 net acre lot perpendicular to current Mekong Supermarket building on the southern end. Mekong 88 is located in Mesa's Asian District, which contains more than 70 Asian-related businesses, near Dobson Road in West Mesa.

Q: What are the City's plans for Fiesta Mall?

FH: The Fiesta Mall site has always been a priority of mine. The property was owned by several different owners who did not have the same vision for the site. This represented a challenge in moving forward with redevelopment. I am happy to announce that the property will soon be owned by one entity, and we will be able to move forward with master planning for the site. I look forward to working with the developers, city staff and the community to see this site reemerge as a major hub for West Mesa.

Save Money with Xeriscope

Did you know that grass landscapes use twice as much water as desert landscaping? Converting grass into an attractive low water using landscape is one of the best ways to conserve water and energy, save money on your water bill and reduce maintenance.

The City of Mesa is offering a Grass-to-Xeriscape Landscape Incentive. When a

homeowner applies to remove at least 500 square feet or more of established and living grass and plans to replace it with low water use plants (not just artificial turf), the project may qualify to receive a \$500 incentive from the City of Mesa. Grass must be alive at time of application and completed projects are not eligible to apply.

With our Trees Are Cool additional incentive, Grass-to-Xeriscape Landscape Incentive applicants who add low water use trees to their new converted landscape may be eligible to receive an additional \$75! The Grass-to-Xeriscape program is designed to save water, and it also is intended to promote overall sustainability. This includes reducing heat island effect through plant shading. Plants also supply oxygen, provide wildlife habitat, and absorb carbon dioxide, among other environmental benefits. Take our online quiz at mesaaz.gov/conservation to see if you might qualify!

Understandably, converting from grass to Xeriscape can be a big decision for homeowners, businesses and communities. But, don't be concerned that Xeriscape is just rocks

and cactus. There are hundreds of varieties of low water use plants that bring color, beauty and function to the landscape. Xeriscape is common sense landscaping incorporating principles such as good planning, use of well-adapted plants, efficient irrigation, use of water-saving mulches and more.

While it does require some "up front" money to convert grass to Xeriscape, it will save dollars in the long run. The costs can vary greatly depending on existing conditions and desired landscape changes. It requires 35,000 gallons per year to properly water 1,000 square feet of turf, while low water use plants use only 15,000 gallons for the same amount of space. If you're still looking for more reasons to convert here are...

The Top Ten Reasons to Convert to Xeriscape: 10. Save Time - Grass will need mowing once every week



or two. Fertilizing should be done monthly. Mowers, weed whackers and irrigation require maintenance. Dethatching and aerating are also needed periodically. Don't forget to add weed, disease and pest control to your schedule.

9. Save Water - Bermuda and ryegrass require about 60 inches of water each year, but we average only 8 inches of rainfall each year (and last year we were not even close to that). In comparison, a Xeriscape uses one-half to two-thirds LESS water than a lawn.

8. Preserve Water Quality & Save Energy - Less or even no fertilizers and pesticides are needed with Xeriscape. Much of our water pollution comes from runoff of these products from urban landscapes. Xeriscapes also provide great energy-saving benefits. A lawn has been shown to reduce home cooling requirements as much as 4 percent compared to a home with no vegetation cover. However, a Xeriscape

> with good tree, shrub and vine placement can cut cooling costs up to 46 percent.

> 7. Save Money - Save on the cost of water, fertilizer, mowing, seed and labor. Other costs that often aren't considered include water damage to walls, private streets and mower damage to trees or the irrigation system. Additional savings can come from the lower energy bills when plants are placed strategically around buildings.

6. Save Landfill Space - Grass clippings create a great deal of waste for the landfills.

5. Save the Air - Two-cycle engines such as gas-powered mowers, blowers and weed trimmers contribute to our air pollution problems.

4. Decrease Noise Pollution -

Mowers, weed whackers and leaf blowers have become a major source of background noise in many neighborhoods.

3. Set an Example - One good conversion begets another... you'll by surprised by the inspiration you can provide to your neighbors. If you look to the future and respect our desert environment, this is an opportunity to demonstrate your commitment to using our natural resources wisely.

2. Save Frustration - Common problems include fertilizer issues, dead spots caused by diseases, and constant upkeep and maintenance of irrigation. Plus, you'll be mowing during the hottest part of summer when Bermuda grows best.

1. No More Mowing - This is your chance... how many parts of the country are there where you can totally get away with not having a lawn?!

At Our Lakes

Summer at the Ranch

Though the official start date of the monsoon season is June 15th, here, at the Ranch, we typically do not see any measurable rainfall until after the Fourth of July. The middle and end of June brought excessive heat, with excessive heat warnings put in place for most of the State.

Last year we saw 105 days with temperatures of 100 degrees or higher, this year

our first 100-degree day was on Wednesday, May 5th, compared to last year's first 100-degree day being recorded on April 26th. Typically, our first 100-degree day here in the Valley happens the first week of May. With our summer having an average start and June typically being our hottest month on average, we can expect high and dry conditions until the monsoon arrives to give us some much-needed moisture.

High air temperatures increase soil temperatures which, in turn, increase water temperatures in our lakes. At the end of June water levels in our lakes were increased to a total of 12.8-acre feet of water over the normal level to combat the excessive heat. An acre-foot of water is 43,560 cubic feet of water which equals about 326,000 gallons. Depending on the monsoon forecast, the lake draw will be adjusted, and water levels lowered to make room for storm water. Last year's monsoon did not bring much in the way of rainfall. Few areas surpassed 1 inch of rainfall in 2020. We saw 4 to 5 inches in 2018 and 2019.

The monsoon is driven by shifting winds bringing in moisture from the Gulf of Mexico and the Gulf of California. As our summer heat builds, that moisture rises and produces powerful thunderstorms. This year **The Climate Prediction Center** puts the Phoenix metropolitan area under equal chances for abovenormal, below-normal, or near-normal rainfall. In other words, we will just have to wait and see. (*Must be nice to be a meteorologist!*)

As for our lakes, high water temps and ample amounts of sunlight drive photosynthesis, phytoplankton (*tiny plants*) and zooplankton (*tiny animals*), which will begin to thrive causing our lakes to green. Lake conditions will be monitored to make sure these processes do not get out of hand. Migratory birds will continue to head back north for the summer, while our resident birds will tough it out with the rest of us.

Just a friendly reminder! Please do not feed the ducks and geese, it is important for them to be encouraged to head back north for the summer. Too many resident birds can cause a strain on our lake systems, and nothing is worse than getting company that sticks around for free food!

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
