Pools – Dobson Ranch has four pools at three different locations for residents to enjoy. Saratoga, La Casita and Los Altos. Water Awareness

A Mere Technicality

There are many technical issues that deal with the water we use. Some of these details deal with the changing climate and how to mitigate the impact

of the ongoing drought. Ian James wrote an article that appeared in the April 11th edition of the *Arizona Republic* about the drying-up of the Colorado River and how and why Arizona will no longer have access to its full share of the water held in Lake Mead.

In that article about the Colorado River, the author reported that the water level in Lake Mead will drop below the first-tier alarm limit (1,075 feet above sea level) by the end of this year bringing into play agreed upon cutbacks in the amount of water released from Lake Mead. Arizona is at the bottom of the list; meaning deliveries to our CAP system will be the first to be reduced. This agreement was hashed out and codified when the 2019 Drought Contingency Plan was signed.

Conservation is central to our response to the loss of Colorado River water. The measure widely used for assessing water use in residential settings is "GPCD" or gallons per capita per day. My daily average water usage is roughly 324 gallons per day as reported on my City of Mesa utility bill is about 162 gallons

per capita (for the two of us) per day. That is a little high given the average water consumption for Dobson Ranch has historically been between 120 and 100 GPCD.



Dobson Ranch's water supply does not currently rely upon CAP water from the Colorado River. Our water comes from Lake Roosevelt and the SRP system, but that might not always be the case. Dobson Ranch, however, has been embracing

water conservation techniques for many years now; we know we live in a desert and must conserve water. Look around, much of the residential landscape in Dobson Ranch features desert-adapted plants and other desert landscape features. Many home renovations now include features like energy-efficient and low-water use dishwashers and washing machines, land many low-flow toilets and shower heads have also been installed.

We need to help make the Drought Contingency Plan work. Soon GPCD will become the watch word. Look at your City of Mesa utility bill each month and track your own GPCD. Awareness will make clear how our desert-adapted homes already are helping sustain Dobson Ranch as the place to live in the Arizona desert.

DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

Watering Trees


So many trees are dying all over the Valley and Ranch this year, especially pine trees, due to improper watering, lack of rain and the summer of 2020. Most just need a deep, slow watering. Other landscape plants and cactus and succulents also need this kind of watering. Unless you get rain to penetrate 2-3 feet deep, apply extra. I water my tree and landscape plants once a month, in the warm months, if we don't get rain.

Having drip or bubblers next to the base of a tree doesn't allow water to reach the roots at the drip line where the roots are that take up the moisture. Roots don't grow in the top 3+ inches of the soil here as the ground is just too hot. Shallow watering encourages roots to grow very shallow, allowing the tree to fall over in a high wind and to collect harmful soil salts around the roots. Trees have deep anchoring roots below the trunk and other roots 2-3 feet below the soil surface that extend out to the drip line and beyond. These are the roots that will absorb water.

So how much should you water? Give plants enough water to get down to the root level. Apply water at the drip line, slow and deep with a hose, for about an hour at least. To check if the water has reached the correct level, push in a soil probe like a piece of rebar. When it reaches resistance, that's how far the water got. You then know how to adjust the timing for your watering.

I use a soaker hose made from recycled tires that I bought at Lowe's. It permits the water to slowly ooze out the whole length and go directly in the soil with minimal air evaporation. I can easily adjust it to the size of the tree/plant. Most large trees need an hour or more on one side and the same on the other side.

The oozer hose works great as it allows me to get the water just where I want it. The oozer hose saves water and makes everyone happy.

Got Plans This Summer? How About ZomBee Hunting!

It is May already, and according to the calendar, summer is right around the corner. Although summer "officially" starts mid-June, to me it starts when we hit triple digits for the first time in the new year. Here in the Valley of the Sun, the average date for the first 100-degree

day is May 2, which is hard to think of at the time of this writing because we are experiencing perfect 80-degree days. If you keep track, the earliest date we hit 100 was March 16, 1988 and on the flip side, the latest was June 18 back in 1913. (If you heard a family legend about that fine summer, it is true.)

In spite of the heat, you may be hankering to be outside a lot this summer, in need of a change from jigsaw puzzles, or cleaning out cupboards, or whatever helped you make it through the Summer of 2020. How about signing up for a Citizen Science Project? Citizen Science Projects are collaborations between scientists and volunteers, where volunteers have the opportunity to contribute to research. With your help, scientists can better understand what is going on in the environment and offer solutions to potential problems.

An easy way to get started with Citizen Science is through the EcoFlora project, a new initiative of the Desert Botanical Garden. The Garden (DBG.org) wants an inventory of the urban biodiversity

in Greater Phoenix. It is in need of photographs of the plants, animals and insects in our community, on local trails, etc. The data collected will help inform the DBG on how to protect and preserve the native plants and wildlife in the area.

Participation in the *EcoFlora* project is done through *iNaturalist*, one of the world's most popular nature apps. The use of *iNaturalist* has been highlighted in past Conservation Corners as an alternative to feeding the wildlife in Dobson Ranch. To take part in *EcoFlora*, create an account in

the iNaturalist app or at *iNaturalist.org*, join the "Metro Phoenix *EcoFlora* project," and take photos of the plants, animals and insects you come across. Once the photos are uploaded, your observations are automatically included in the project. Yes, it's that simple to participate!

Another easy Citizen Science Project is a favorite of the Water Management/Lake Habitat Committee: Rainlog.org. All that is needed is a rain gauge and a Rainlog.org account (and, fingers crossed, a better monsoon season than the one last year). Each morning, simply enter the amount of rain collected in your rain gauge from the day before. The rain totals are used to monitor precipitation amounts and help in watershed management activities and drought planning. Rainlog.org is a partnership between organizations like UA, SRP, Arizona Department of Water Resources and your help is appreciated.

Citizen Science

Finally, a great opportunity is available through our very own Mesa Public Library. The library is part of a first-of-its-kind initiative between ASU and SciStarter to help connect communities to Citizen Science. With your library card, you can borrow the actual tools needed to collect data and participate in scientific studies. There is a "Stream Mapping Kit," where you'll map streams with a GPS unit and a thermometer. Or, how about the "ZomBee Hunting Kit," where you'll track the honey bee parasite that is

causing hives to die off. This kit contains a special light bulb, trap and all the materials

needed to set up the light trap at home. To learn more about the available projects, check out *SciStarter.org*/library or visit the "Citizen Science at Your Library" display at the Main Library: 64 E. First Street, Mesa 85201, 480-644-3100.

Whether you are concerned, curious, or motivated to make a difference in the environment, participating in a Citizen Science Project has never been easier - many are literally at your fingertips. The projects let all ages get involved in the scientific process, while having fun at the same time. Together, we can make a positive difference to the environment and ensure that Dobson Ranch continues as a community leader in conservation practice.

Stepping Up to Share Desert Gardening Tips

Stapelia gigantea is an otherworldly plant. It's flowers

smell like rotten meat, and flies are the pollinators.



Long-time Ranch resident **Sue Hakala** stepped up to become our newest *Ranchers' RoundUp* columnist. She will be sharing her extensive knowledge with us about successful gardening in the Sonoran desert.

Q: How long have you been a resident of Dobson Ranch? What is your family status? SH: My husband Terry and I moved to the

Saratoga Lakes area of the Ranch in 1978. We've been married for 48 loving and wonderful years.

Q: What is your college background?

SH: I graduated from Northern Illinois University in 1971 with a Bachelor's Degree in Art Education. I earned my Master's Degree from Governor's State University in Art History and Pottery.

Q: What years did you serve on the Dobson Ranch Board of Directors? What issues did you face during that time?

SH: When I served on the Board (1987 to 1992), one of the issues I remember frequently debating was house paint color. With my art background, I knew how hard it was for most people to

understand color. I suggested that there be actual paint chips for

residents to help them select a paint color for their homes. Paint chips have been in use ever since making the decision-making process easier for all.

Q: Why did you volunteer to write a monthly column for Ranchers' RoundUp? What types of topics will you cover? SH: When I go on my daily walk, I get so sad seeing so many plants, and especially trees, dying from lack of water. My husband challenged me to do something about it, so I decided to step forward and offer to write a monthly column.

A few of the topics that I plan to cover are: how to water a tree and other plants correctly; using shade cloth; vegetable gardening; citrus care; planting and

caring for cactus and succulent plants; how to help your plants endure the summer; and termites, aphids, and other pests.

Q: Tell us about your experience as Director of Education at the Desert Botanical Garden.

SH: I worked there for over two years, recruiting, training and supervising volunteers, staff, teaching staff, guest speakers and field experts. I developed curricula for classes, workshops and field trip offerings, wrote grants, and did in-depth research on desert plants. Everything was directed at teaching people how to successfully garden here in the Sonoran Desert. Two of my lasting legacies are the touch carts the public can encounter as they tour the garden and the in-depth information posted with every plant offered for sale at the Garden's plant sales.

Q: How did you become a certified volunteer Master Gardener?
SH: I've always believed in volunteering to give back to the community. When I retired, I decided to further pursue my

interest in desert plants by becoming a certified Master Gardener and continue to help people learn how to successfully garden here in the low desert. After attending a series of classes over many months, covering all aspects of gardening, I was required to volunteer at least 50 hours each year and to complete additional educational opportunities sanctioned by the Extension Service. It was a joy!

Although I've volunteered for many different things through the years, the thing I like best has been researching and writing articles covering many natural history subjects. I was asked to write the *Bug of the Month* column for the monthly newsletter when the staff entomologist retired. I have to say it opened up a whole new world of wonder for me.

Q: Tell us about your experience writing a regular column for the Mesa Tribune and being a freeance writer.

SH: I was asked by the editor of the entertainment section at the Mesa Tribune to write a column about the arts in the East Valley. He didn't want me to write about the events the arts organizations present, but rather about the people who make the organizations function. Everything from the executive director, to why people volunteer for the organization/serve

on the board of directors, where they get their funding, who gives it to them, and more during the period of 1984-1988. Due to the explosive growth in the East Valley, the editor moved me over to real estate. I toured and wrote about new housing developments and some of the staff that made it happen from 1988-1991. During this time, I also wrote a number of professional and travel articles published locally and nationally.

Q: How did your yard get featured in *Phoenix Home and Garden* magazine and included on two garden tours?

SH: At the time, the magazine was featuring home gardeners who do it all themselves. Somehow they found out about me and chose to feature my Stapelias and yard in the publication.

Our garden was selected to be one of five gardens in the first Real Gardens for Real People tour by the Master Gardeners. About 800 people visited that day. Our home was also selected to be on a garden tour featuring three Dobson Ranch gardeners by the Central Arizona Cactus and Succulent Society.

Q: How many gardening articles have you published?

SH: I've published over 400 gardening articles. Many have been published in Maricopa County Extension Service publications and newsletters, all checked for scientific accuracy. My articles have been in the Cactus and Succulent Society of America's Journal and To the Point, distributed internationally, and several on-line cactus and succulent publications. I also wrote a book called Drought Gardening published in 1981.



Tennis Tip for May: The "Sweet Spot"

Hitting the "Sweet Spot"

When bowling, all bowlers are aiming for the No.1 pin (Head Pin) to have the best opportunity

to strike. In archery, as well in darts, the ultimate placement shot is hitting the bullseye and this takes accurate placement and precision. In golf, when teeing off to drive the ball the farthest, one must hit a certain area of the club to accomplish this.



As tennis players, one must strike the ball in the "sweet spot" area of the racket to get the best power, comfort and control. In doing so, it shows you are accurate with your timing during ball striking.

What is the sweet spot? A tennis racquet, like a baseball or cricket bat, has a sweet spot. If a ball impacts at the sweet spot, the force transmitted to the hand is sufficiently small that the player is almost unaware that the impact has occured.

Hitting the sweet spot is a big plus! Which is why you should make it one of your goals and practice it regularly. You'd see the following results:

- You'd be able to generate more power with less effort.
- You'd have more control.
- You'd reduce excessive stress on your body, preventing injuries.
- You'd enjoy hitting your shots even more.

Simply put, consistently hitting the sweet spot makes you a better player, period. And, who doesn't want to get better?

5 Reasons Why You May Not Be Hitting the Sweet Spot of your Racket:

- 1. Not watching the ball well during striking.
- 2. Moving the head too much.
- 3. Too wristy.
- 4. Too far or too close to the ball.
- 5. Slow down and not rush the ball.

Even the best players on the pro tour will tend to miss-hit and not hitting the sweet spot area. So, next time during play or practice, take notice of how well you are hitting your corrective strike zone on your racket face, and if you do hit this area then hitting will be "sweet."

Summer Academy Opportunities

Summer opportunities abound for students at Mesa Public Schools. Starting June 1, district students in kindergarten through 12th grade can participate in a variety of exciting learning and enrichment activities. Many opportunities will be available free or at a reduced cost thanks to federal coronavirus relief (ESSER) funds. Programming includes site-based opportunities at every school, music camp, Xplore, online learning and more.

Eisenhower Center for Innovation Principal Robby Meldau is excited for the summer program and says his teachers have committed to providing rich learning opportunities that are also fun for the students.

"We want this summer school to look and feel different than years past," Meldeau says, "This experience is about restoring a relationship to school and learning for our students."

Poston Junior High Principal Michael Rapier says summer academies are a wonderful opportunity for students entering junior high to launch their on-campus experience in a smaller group.

"Students will be able to walk from class to class, see where the cafeteria is located and build their confidence," Rapier shares. "Teachers are looking forward to building relationships with students, and we can support and remove any anxieties they may be experiencing."

School-based Programming and Online Learning

Free school-based programming for students in grades K-8 is available June 1-18. For students in grades 9-12, free school-based programming runs June 1-July 9 at all senior high sites except Skyline High, which will offer programming June 1-30. Transportation and meals will be provided at school-based programs.

Mesa Digital Learning Program (MDLP) will provide free online learning for enrolled students in grades 5-12. All courses are self-paced and taught by appropriately certified teachers. Shepherd Junior High hosts free summer music camp for students in grades 3-8 June 1-18. Classes include band, orchestra, ukulele, music composition and guitar. Students are grouped by ability level based on their years of experience.

The community education department will offer free senior high summer school for enrolled students in grades 9-12. The program runs June 1-18 and June 21-July 9 at Dobson and Red Mountain high schools.

Summer Xplore is a full-day instructional and recreational program available five days a week from 6:30 am to 6:00 pm. The program is offered June 1-July 28 at Franklin at Brimhall, Hermosa Vista, Mesa Center for Success at Jordan and SHARP. Additional locations may be added. Reduced fees are \$82.50/week with a one-time \$12.50 material fee.


