Message From the Association President

As previously mentioned, earlier this year our Executive Director discovered and made us aware of some serious concerns regarding the financial health of Dobson Ranch. A combination of financial errors, inflation, increasing costs

associated with maintaining an aging community, and failing to increase assessments consistently to account for these factors has accumulated into a significant financial operating deficit. We have been working with a great team of experienced financial professionals to help clarify the extent of the deficit and help guide us forward.

Our financial team is still working through their process, but we want to make sure all owner members are aware of the current situation. These numbers are preliminary and subject to change. Currently we anticipate approximately a \$600,000 DEFICIT to our Operating budget for 2023. We are looking at several options, both to increase revenue and cut expenses, but this will not be an easy fix.

Overcoming this will require your help. Our community documents limit assessment increases to 5% annually, unless a larger amount is approved by a vote of owner members. However, an increase of 5% will still leave us with a large deficit for 2024. A balanced budget would likely include closing amenities, eliminating events, and reducing the upkeep of our community. We will be reaching out to ask you to vote and approve an assessment increase of 20% for **2024**, which would equate to an increase of just \$10.14 per month. It would provide the additional \$600,000 needed to break even in 2024. The Association has already made several budget cuts and, even if the increase is approved, more will be needed to allow Dobson Ranch to operate effectively and maintain our community to the level we all expect and deserve. We understand that this is a big request of our owner members, but it is one that is necessary to ensure the health of our community and for Dobson Ranch to continue as "The Best Place to Live".

As we move forward, the Board will provide regular updates on our progress and further actions taken via monthly Board meetings, the weekly Executive Director's E-Blast, and the website. We're determined to learn more and educate the community to ensure a better future for Dobson Ranch. We appreciate your support. Should you have any questions, please email BOD@dobsonranch.com.



Code Compliance Specialist's Message

I appreciate the opportunity to address some common concerns that have arisen since I started this job. It has been a pleasure meeting many of you and providing answers to your questions. One particular topic that has been frequently brought up is the violation order, and I would like to provide some clarity on this matter. Here is the sequence in which you will receive violations:

First Notice: Consider this a friendly reminder rather than an actual violation. We have noticed something that requires your attention, and we want to ensure you are aware of it. You have a grace period of 15 days to rectify the issue.

First Violation: If you receive this violation, it means the issue highlighted in the first notice has not been addressed within the given timeframe. We will notify you for the first time that this is now considered a violation. You still have 15 days to resolve the matter.

Second Violation: This notice indicates that you have disregarded the previous two letters or emails. Failure to address the issue within the next 15 days will result in a \$75 fine.


Third Violation: A fine of \$75 will be levied on your account. If the matter is not resolved within 15 days, the fine will increase to \$125.

Please note that the above listed process allows for 45 days to cure the violation.

For additional information regarding the violation/compliance process, please see the approved Residential Architectural Guidelines approved on June 14, 2022 posted on dobsonranchhoa.com under Governing Documents.

Regarding palm trees, we would like to clarify that reminders to have them trimmed were intended as proactive prompts to encourage you to arrange for trimming. However, if by September the trimming has not been completed, it will be considered a violation. This approach was chosen as the most effective means of ensuring the message reaches everyone.

If you would like to appeal a violation fine, you must file via email to **hoa.admin@dobsonranch.com**. Once filed, you will be notified when the next Board of Directors meeting is and you must attend in person and address the Board for the fine to be considered for removal. Thank you to everyone who is taking care of their properties and addressing violations on time!







DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

Crested Saguaros

What is a crested saguaro (Carnegia gigantea)? The explanation below comes from the National Park Service, U.S. Department of the Interior, Saguaro National Park Resource Management Division website. "Cristate or crested saguaros, or other cactus, form when the cells in the growing stem begin to divide outward rather than in the circular pattern of a normal cactus. This is an unusual mutation which results in the growth of a large fan-shaped crest at the growing tip of a saguaro's main stem or arms."

Saguaro "crests" generally measure between 3-5 feet in diameter. The largest crest in reported history was said to be nine feet across; though never confirmed. Cristate saguaros commonly grow in the shape of a fan or semi-circle. They tend to exhibit convoluted patterns and folds and have even been said to resemble broccoli.

The cause for this mutation is unknown. However, there has been some speculation about the presence of a "trigger" which may initiate the process. One heavily implicated trigger is frost, as crested saguaros tend to be more common in the northernmost parts of their range. Unfortunately, there is not enough evidence to confirm this theory.

While saguaro crests do tend to be larger and more elaborate, other species of cacti are more than capable of developing similar mutations (see below). Crests have been noted in a variety of succulent plants, from agave, to cholla, to prickly pear, and they occur in all different shapes and sizes. I've seen some in yards on Dobson Ranch.

To see a variety of crested saguaros, go to Facebook and search for the **Crested Saguaro Society**. Or search their website, *crestedsaguarosociety.org*. It has LOTS of photographs of crested plants organized by Arizona county, California, Nevada, and Mexico. The Society is comprised of naturalists who volunteer their time to locate and photograph crested saguaros. They have documented over 2,200 crested plants. The crests are zany, incredible, artistic, and just plain fabulous! Do spend time looking at these incredible plants. With the Society's permission, the photos are from their website.

WORKING OUTDOORS IN WARM CLIMATES

Sunlight contains ultraviolet (UV) radiation, which causes premature aging of the skin, wrinkles, cataracts, and skin cancer. There are no safe UV rays or safe suntans. Be especially careful in the sun if you burn easily, spend a lot of time outdoors, or have any of the following physical features: numerous, irregular, or large moles; freckles; fair skin; blond, red, or light brown hair.

Here's how to block those harmful rays:

- Cover up. Wear loose-fitting, long sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Use sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30. Be sure to follow application directions on the bottle or tube.
- Wear a hat. A wide brim hat, not a baseball cap, works best because it protects the neck, ears, eyes, forehead, nose, and scalp.
- Wear UV-absorbent sunglasses (eye protection). Sunglasses don't have to be expensive, but they should block 99 to 100% of UVA and UVB radiation. Before you buy sunglasses, read the product tag or label.
- Limit exposure. UV rays are most intense between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Heat

The combination of heat and humidity can be a serious health threat during the summer months. If you work outside (for example, at a beach resort, on a farm, at a construction site) or in a kitchen, laundry, or bakery you may be at increased risk for heat-related illness. Here's how to take precautions.

- Drink small amounts of water frequently.
- Wear light-colored, loose-fitting, breathable clothing—cotton is good.
- Take frequent short breaks in cool shade.
- Eat smaller meals before work activity.
- Avoid caffeine and alcohol or large amounts of sugar.
- Work in the shade.
- Find out from your health care provider if your medications and heat don't mix.
- Know that equipment such as respirators or work suits can increase heat stress. There are three kinds of major heat related disorders—heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. You need to know how to recognize each one and what first aid treatment is necessary

Simply spend one hour learning about desert-adapted shade trees, how to plant, best places to plant, etc., and then choose your trees. The free 4'-6' saplings will be ready for your pick-up at Mesa Community College on Saturday, November 18. Don't miss out on your chance to get free trees for your yard - sign up today at srp.net/shadetrees.

In honor of Dobson Ranch's 50th Anniversary, how about we aim for at least 50 residents participating in this fall's Shade Tree Program? This way there would be 100 new trees in the community. Do you know the City of Mesa also has a goal for new trees planted in the city? One million* by the year 2050! (*said in your best Austin Powers accent). The great news is that your new shade trees count towards the city's goal. Here is more information on how to participate from our friends with the Environmental and Sustainability Department:

Trees are environmental superheroes – they fight climate change in multiple ways and play a crucial role in creating healthier and more livable cities. They remove carbon dioxide from our atmosphere, absorb and clean our air of other pollutants and help reduce and clean stormwater runoff. Besides cooling our neighborhoods and making our streets more walkable, they also reduce energy consumption by shading our homes and even save water when the tree of choice is a desert-adapted variety.

That is why Mesa Mayor John Giles recently announced a new initiative called **Trees Are Cool** with a goal of increasing the City's tree canopy coverage to 15 percent and planting 1,000,000 new trees in Mesa by 2050. But the City can't achieve this goal alone – residents and businesses are encouraged to get involved in this effort.

"We need to work together to ensure that our community can withstand the changing weather patterns caused by climate change, both in terms of extreme temperatures and ongoing drought," said Scott Bouchie, director of the Environmental and Sustainability Department. "It is especially important to reduce temperatures in our most vulnerable neighborhoods. And planting trees can help us do this."

As part of the Trees Are Cool initiative, Mesa launched an online tool for residents and businesses to record newly planted trees that includes a map that shows tree coverage in the city. Additionally, the page features helpful information on choosing, planting and caring for trees.

The Trees are Cool initiative supports Mesa's Climate Action Plan and responds to feedback from community members about the City's environmental goals. Trees offer one solution for cooling our communities by shading surfaces and providing a cooling effect when water vapor evaporates from the leaves.

The Bountiful World of Natural Medicine

Before there were hospitals, psychologists, nurses and advanced medical technology, there were herbs. Natural medicine has been around for centuries, and each part of the world has its own special holistic remedies to help heal certain ailments. Today, herbs are still beneficial and one Dobson Ranch resident practices as a Clinical Herbalist. Juliana Bishop with her company, Herbal Jules specializes in Chinese, Western & Ayurvedic medicine.

Juliana grew up in New York State and was introduced to the beauty of the natural world from a young age. Her mother would often take Juliana around in the woods and show her different plants that were growing and teach her about what they could be used for. Juliana explained, "My upbringing helped me to always gravitate towards nature's beauty, and my mother always encouraged us to first try using herbs for medical reasons, unless it was an emergency. My father also used natural remedies, so I grew up with a great support system that I believe inspired me to become an herbalist. Because my dad was sensitive to over the counter medication he would use natural whenever possible and it wasn't until after I became an Herbalist that he really learned more about herbs and supplements. When I was little, I

was also very close to my Grandmother who had cancer and I was determined to learn about alternative medicines as a result of losing her when I was seven."

Juliana first received her bachelor's in psychology from Goucher College and eventually made it out to Arizona, when she was admitted to the Southwest Institute of Healing Arts because she was very interested in studying western plants. Juliana explained how plants in the West differ from plants in the East Coast due to the climate. "In the East Coast, there are many mushrooms, berries such as Elderberry and wildflowers such as Dandelions or Red Clover Blossoms. And in the West grows Jojoba, Creosote, and agave. What's amazing is that many of these plants will show you what they may be good for. For example, yellow Dandelion flowers have been traditionally used for Jaundice, and Red Clover Blossoms may be good for the blood. Jojoba leaves looks like small praying hands and is great for the skin. There is a world of benefits out there and many plants can have many meanings, so it's always good to do research."

In her free time from experimenting with different herbs in her herbal clinic, Juliana also gives back by teaching others about herbs. Juliana taught several classes at Sunflowers (now Sprouts) and also taught students enrolled at the Southwest Institute of Healing Arts. "A lot of my classes included talks about certain supplements and vitamins that we all take because there are actually a lot of different herbs in those supplements that people might not be aware of." Juliana gave her thoughts on some helpful tips for those who may want to become herbalists as well. She explained, "I would encourage people who want to practice herbalism, to do a lot of research online and get some books and references about different herbs. A good place to begin is with tea. There is so much to learn about tea leaves and what else can be paired in tea such as chamomile, peppermint, and citrus fruits. It is important to know about the plant first before experimenting with it because it could still be potentially harmful if taken in large doses, like anything. It's also very important to find a good source for purchasing organic herbs such as from Mountain Rose Herbs. There are many great resources out there."

Juliana also explained the types of tools and materials she has within her herbal clinic. "It's important to have scales to measure materials precisely, some mason jars to place dried or wet herbs and plants within, some alcohol to help draw out the medicinal properties, a.k.a. constituents from the plants, as well as cheesecloth and a sausage press to press out the liquid. It's a process that takes time to master, but is fun!" Herbalists are usually incorporated within a client's full self-care plan along with seeing their doctor to help with more advanced medical issues. Herbs have been traditionally used for anxiety, stress and pain, and herbalists can only recommend certain herbs and not diagnose, treat or cure health issues.

Juliana has built a great business here in Arizona and she loves living in Dobson Ranch. She has lived in the community for seven years, is newly married, and has a 15-year-old daughter, Ariana, who also loves practicing herbalism. "We absolutely love living in Dobson Ranch and we feel right at home here," finalized Juliana.



The Lakes

Lakes & Fish Report

Waterfowl: Why not feed them?

Ducks and geese are a beautiful sight on a small urban pond or lake. They make our lakes look more natural lakes, and not many things around a lake are more fun than watching a group of ducklings paddling along behind their mother. However, when ducks and geese become too numerous, several lake management and aesthetic problems can develop.

Bird droppings can be a nuisance and aesthetic detraction along the shoreline. The droppings can create slippery conditions along the shoreline. Some waterfowl, such as geese, can become aggressive to humans, especially after they have become accustomed to being fed human food. Foraging for vegetation on land can provide a source of nitrogen and phosphorus; nutrients that stimulate algae growth in a lake and cause the water to turn green. They convert it to water-soluble forms of nitrogen and phosphorus during digestion. The wastes are then deposited in the lake while the waterfowl swim or along the shoreline as they rest. Bird wastes contain fecal bacteria which can pose a human health risk.

The most effective way to discourage long term inhabitant populations is to limit non-natural food sources. Residents who set out food or actively feed them may be supporting unnaturally high waterfowl populations. When food becomes limited, ducks will leave to find a new source of food. If you continually feed them, the ducks will never leave; even migratory waterfowl may take up permanent residence. Feeding ducks items such as bread and popcorn is also very harmful to the animals. Uneaten bread and popcorn are decomposed by bacteria; a process that is accelerated with high summer temperatures. One common bacterium that grows on the food (Clostridium botulinum) is responsible for botulism. If a duck eats the contaminated food directly or inadvertently eats an organism that consumed the contaminated food, the duck can become very ill and slowly die.

Updates on lake activity can be found on the Dobson Ranch App. Please download today by scanning the QR code with your smart phone's camera and set the alert notification.

NOTE: It is highly recommended to use single barbless hooks when catching and releasing fish.

Doing so, will reduce the trauma afflicted to the fish and keep the habitat and fish population healthy! Thank you!



Defining the Future at Mesa Public Schools

In 2018, the Mesa Public Schools community approved a \$300 million bond for capital projects that provided much-needed improvements to schools across the district. The community has generously kept an override in place since 1995, to support salaries and employee-related expenses.

Mesa Public Schools is aligning district facilities to support the needs of students. Projects completed include reinforced school safety and security systems, in-classroom technology, and renovations at Mountain View and Mesa High featuring new athletic fields, a performing arts center, and sci-tech and student services buildings.

Allen Moore, MPS school safety and security director, shares that the district used bond money to establish very secure schools. Mesa created strong perimeter fencing, designed secure lobbies with one point of entry and video surveillance, installed riot film on all glass windows that have students behind them, and added blue strobe lights to signal danger in conjunction with a mobile app that allows any staff member who sees a threat, to put their facility into lockdown. Currently, 37 schools have been fully renovated to the district's current standards in school safety, and 2,400 video cameras have been installed throughout the district.

"Without the bond dollars, we couldn't do any of this important work, keeping our students safe," Moore says. **Scott Thompson, Assistant Superintendent,** shares the bond money supports student learning and helping students understand their career pathways. A great example is the new scitech building at Mesa High School.

"I visited the new welding area at Mesa High, and students were incredibly excited. They just finished working on a two day project that would have taken them two weeks in their old facility," Thompson shares. "The bond money provided the ability to create a proper environment where students can learn and create."

Mesa Public Schools is asking the community for a continuation of the bond and override to carry on the work being done. During the **November 7th** special election, voters will have the opportunity to authorize the sale of up to \$500 million in bonds for capital improvements and a 15% budget override continuation.

Mesa is the largest school district in Arizona, and there is more work to be done. Along with continued school safety renovations, the district would like to continue upgrading HVAC systems to newer, more efficient units, replace portable classrooms with permanent buildings, and continue to remodel and update aging schools. The override is used for staffing, funding 13.9% of employees' paychecks, as well as supporting workforce and college development, and lower class sizes.

"The override is a tax that is already in place," Thompson shares. "We are asking the community to keep the tax in place so that we can continue to be competitive attracting qualified teachers and staff."

I love living in AZ but I admit this time of year is my least favorite due to the extreme heat. We've reached the time of year when (for me) even the pool fails to provide relief. So, to escape the heat and release some of my kid's energy, below are my favorite local indoor adventure spots.

Located in downtown Mesa is the Arizona Natural History Museum featuring the Dinosaur Mountain, a three story look at the Triassic, Jurassic, and Cretaceous periods, featuring a flash flood on the mountain. Nearby is Dinosaur Hall and 75,000,000 B.C displaying what Arizona looked like 75 million years ago. My kids love the Origins gallery and the exploration station. Located right around the corner is the IDEA Museum with art exhibitions and STEAM activities. The Hub has a gallery of interactive artwork you can partake in and Artville is a play space geared for smaller children.

In downtown Phoenix is the Arizona Science Center. The shows in the Planetarium are always great and my kids love the All About Me section, where they walk through a giant stomach and learn about the human body. There are hands on science opportunities, interactive exhibits like the science of bubbles, the skycycle and the Forces of Nature, an immersion theater where you feel what it is like to be in the middle of a hurricane, tornado, and volcanic eruption. Additionally, there are various traveling exhibits throughout the year. Across the street is the Children's Museum of Phoenix with exhibits and experiences geared toward little kids.

Also in downtown Phoenix is the **Phoenix Art Museum** and the **Heard Museum**. The Phoenix Art Museum has a hall of the miniatures and the museum scavenger hunt was my daughter's favorite. The Heard Museum celebrates art and culture of indigenous communities and is a great place to explore the history and beauty of Arizona's tribal communities.

Arizona Mills has the SeaLife Aquarium and Legoland Discovery Center. Legoland has a 4D cinema, many Lego play zones and indoor rides. SeaLife has many sea creatures including turtles, stingrays, sharks and even an interactive touch pool. Chandler Fashion Mall has the Crayola Experience, an indoor family attraction with hands on activities such as wrapping your own crayon, making personalized coloring pages and melted wax souvenirs.

The Arizona Boardwalk has nine indoor attractions in one location; Butterfly Wonderland, OdySea Aquarium, UFO Experience, Ripley's Believe it or Not, Laser and Mirror Maze, Museum of Illusions, Pangea Land of the Dinosaurs, Cyber Quest and Johnny's Playground in addition to stores and dining options. Personally, our family likes the Four Peaks Mining Co. store, where you can take a free in-store mine tour.

In addition, we have SO many local jump parks! Uptown Jungle, Big Air, Altitude, KTR, AZ Extreme, Urban Air, Jump Street, and Sky Zon, each have their own attractions and opportunities for kids to bounce away their energy. There are also so many indoor Arcades and fun centers, like Main Event, Fat Cats and Dave & Busters. Personally, my favorite time to Ice Skate is in the summer. Public skate options at the Ice Den or AZ Ice are great places to be when temperatures rise. Plus, Skate Land offers fun indoor rollerblading and skating nights, like Glow Skate.

With so many options for indoor fun it can be hard not to go broke while exploring. Our family looks for deals via Groupon or Living Social and purchases a Pogo Pass every year, which offers admission to many local venues for one low price. Plus, free admission for many museums is available via the Culture Pass program at the Mesa Library. There are many budget-friendly ways to explore the great indoors!



Are you a resilient or fragile player? If you possess fragility, you may struggle to handle constructive criticism or feedback and lack openness to improvement. Feedback and criticism serve as valuable reality checks, prompting necessary changes



Continuously making the same mistakes or unforced errors despite playing for an extended period suggests a lack of progress, as one may inadvertently engage in repetitive and unproductive practice. Taking accountability for one's actions and learning from mistakes is crucial, preventing the repetition of errors in an endless loop. Consider the journeys of top sports athletes or individuals leading Fortune 500 companies; their paths to success weren't immediate but filled with lessons learned and opportunities seized. 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


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
