

Board of Directors Meeting Report – October 26, 2023 Summary of Board Action Items and Motions

2023-10-100 A motion was unanimously approved to ladder Reserve Investments totaling \$1,316,517 as presented by Stephanie Fee, Treasurer.

2023-10-101 A motion was unanimously carried to discontinue the Winter Carnival and Pancake Breakfast in 2023.

2023-10-102 A motion was unanimously carried to approve the new Ad Hoc Preschool Committee Charter.

2023-10-103 A motion was unanimously carried to budget up to \$25,000 in additional funding towards the staffing and operation of the La Casita Preschool to honor our commitment and remain compliant through May of 2024 - the preschool is required to be self-sufficient starting June 1, 2024.

2023-10-104 A motion was unanimously carried to hire temporary personnel, if necessary, not to exceed \$47.00 per hour to expedite the collection and processing of records request documents.


Thank you to everyone who attended the HOA Town Hall last month. There were some good questions posed by residents. I hope that the Board presentation and answers helped to suffi-

It's crazy to think we have already reached the Christmas season. And it will be 2024 before we know it.

As we get closer to the end of the year, I want to share with you my TOP 8 Reminders for 2023!

- 1. Please take the time to address any old violations or contact us if you need more time. We are more than happy to work with you - but you need to let us know if you need more time!
- 2. Make sure all holiday decorations are taken down and stored away for next year by mid-January. This includes all holiday lights. Once this deadline passes, we will start to issue *Friendly* Reminders. Thank you for bringing so much joy to the Community with your lively yard creations!
- 3. When you have untrimmed your tree, please do not toss it on the street corner, alleyways, front or side yard, the neighbor's yard or on the golf course. The City of Mesa has multiple drop off locations for your tree to be recycled – like the Dobson Ranch Library -- or the Boy Scouts will pick it up.
- 4. Please make sure you check your trees and bushes to make sure they are not hanging over the lakes, neighbors' wall, or the streets. If they are, please trim, especially if you are on a lake - but please do not allow the trimmings to fall into the
- 5. It's a great time to start thinking about those big exterior home improvement projects for the spring! Submit your Architectural Application for approval now so you are not waiting for your approval at the last minute.
- 6. For your safety and that of the animals, please do not feed the ducks, stray cats, or any other animal that isn't your pet. Feeding the ducks is also a serious health hazard for our lakes and waterfowl!
- 7. Please also make sure your trash bins are closed and put away. We have seen many complaints about the raccoons getting into them.
- 8. Also, a reminder please have dogs on a leash at all times when walking them and please pick up after them. This includes public areas and your yard. We have received multiple complaints recently regarding this safety issue.

From my family to yours, I want to wish your family a very Merry Christmas and hope you enjoy your time together with loved ones and celebrating the year. See you in 2024.



The Lakes

Lakes & Fish Report





Insect and plant invaders are common in Arizona urban lakes. The organisms reduce water quality and the aesthetic pleasure of the lake. These invaders include midge flies, submerged plants (called macrophytes), and floating mats of filamentous algae. In an attempt to minimize the use of insecticides and herbicides, several species of fish have been stocked in the lake. Other fish species have been stocked in the lake to provide game fish for a catchand-release fishing program.

Goldfish (Carassius auratus):

Goldfish are members of the minnow family. They are an extremely adaptable animal, capable of tolerating a wide variety of chemical conditions, temperatures, foods, and spawning conditions. They tend to plow along the bottom of a pond to dislodge food. This is advantageous because the larva (immature form) of the midge fly lives in the upper layer of sediment at the lake bottom. Thus, goldfish are an important natural predator of the midge. If the midge larvae are consumed, the adult swarms along the lake will be reduced.

Grass Carp or White Amur (Ctenopharyngodon idellus):

The grass carp or White Amur is a hardy species that originated

in the rivers of Asia (The Amur River). It was first introduced into the Unites States in 1963. Because the fish are considered exotic, only sterile fish can be stocked. The grass carp is very tolerant of temperature extremes that are common in Arizona lakes. This fish is a voracious eater of aquatic weeds. It can become very large; weighing up to 40 pounds when adequate food is available. The fish will serve as a mechanism of controlling submerged macrophytes and algae mats in the lake.

Fathead Minow (Pimephales promelas): Fathead minnows feed on detritus and algae that feed on the soft bottom of lakes. They will also consume insects and larvae, including those of mosquitoes and midges, near the water surface. They are food for most predatious fish. Nesting habits of the fish involve the eggs being attached to an object that is situated somewhere above the lake bottom, and typically to the underside. The open tubes of the artificial habitat should provide ideal sites for egg laying.

Redear Sunfish (Lepomis microlophus): These sunfish tend to feed breed and generally remain in deeper waters. As biological control agents they feed on microcrustaceans, chironomod (midge fly) larvae and clams.



MEALY BUGS

The allure of succulent juices brings mealy bugs from miles around for a feast on plants. They especially love the junctures

of the stems and roots, hiding in the tiny creases and crevices. Inserting their mouthpiece, they suck out the luxuriant juices. And the plant's life.

START AT THE BEGINNING

After experiencing what I call The Great Death—when years ago mealybugs destroyed 35 plants—I've learned how to avoid them. When I bring any plant home, no matter where it comes from, it goes into isolation for at least a week while I search for bugs or anything else. Every plant is treated with an insect killer. Then the plant gets a week to rest in isolation before I think about repotting or planting.

IF YOU HAVE MEALYBUGS NOW

Mealybugs gather to feast and reproduce. When discovered, immediately put your plant in isolation. The plants near the one you discovered the mealybugs on are probably infected too. Mealybugs love to deposit eggs far and wide. Change the soil and throw it away, not in a compost heap as there will be eggs laid in the soil. Sterilize the pot and start over.

I've found the first line of defense is diligence. Check weekly for withered plants, spying carefully below the soil level for the white sticky substance that indicates their presence. Once discovered, get out the alcohol. Dip a Q-tip in some alcohol and dab each one you find. It's instant death by burning. Hasta luego, baby! In hard to reach places, alcohol in a sprayer does the trick. Spray roots too.

Some gardeners prefer a blast of soapy water, especially when a block party is found under plant leaves and along stems. But remember, the spray knocks off the old and feeble, leaving the macho males and Amazonian females who then produce super-tough kids.

When I've felt outnumbered and overpowered, I continue the battle with poison. Products that contain acephate (02s-dimethyl)acetylphosphoramidothioate as the main ingredient is the only thing I've found that works on mealybugs. Know that some species of mealybugs do not respond to insecticidal systemics. Experiment as some plants may not like the treatment.



ACCENT PLANTS... AND HOW THEY ARE USED IN THE LANDSCAPE

The great variety of plants available today makes it possible to find the right plant for almost any landscape need. One of the most important uses of plants is as accents.

The word 'accent' is a design term for a plant that contrasts with its neighbors and so catches the eye; it has features or characteristics that make it more noticeable than the average plant. Some plants may serve as accents during a particular season with showy flowers, fruit or fall color, while other plants serve as yearround accents with distinctive leaf shapes and colors, stem colors, plant shapes or growth habits and bark characteristics. Smaller accents are more effective when planted in clumps or groups in odd numbers such as three, five, etc. Medium and large accent plants need enough space so the form can be displayed to best advantage. Plant these in groups or as a single specimen.

When selecting accent plants, do not mix non-complementary plants in the same area. For example, do not place an ocotillo beside a citrus tree. Ocotillos are commonly found in the Sonoran and Chihuahuan deserts while citrus are native to Asia, Melanesia and Australia. Not only do they require different amounts of water, which will make them difficult to irrigate correctly, but they visually do not belong together. Plants should work together to create a mood instead of clashing with one another.

Specimen or focal point plants are a sub group of accent plants that are used singly to show off some special feature of the plant such as a unique shape, foliage or color. They are often the largest plants in a landscape. They can be used to draw attention to a feature like an entry door, or can be used as a focal point all on their own.

There are many benefits to incorporating accent plants into your design. Accent plants are a great way to define and enhance your property and do a wonderful job at creating first impressions that are sure to last. There are many types of accent plants to choose from and any landscape will be enhanced by their unique features.

Accent plant choices: Agaves, Aloes, Grasses, Desert Milkweed, Yellow Bells, Ocotillo, Red Bird-of-Paradise, Hesperaloe, Yuccas, Lady Slipper, Saguaro, Texas Ebony, Weeping Bottlebrush

NOTICE ABOUT INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS & CLASS ACTIVITIES

Effective November 1, 2023 the transition of class instructors from full-time employees to Independent Contractors (IC) has led to a noticeable decline in the number of classes offered at Dobson Ranch. Each instructor was allowed to become an Independent Contractor; accepting to do so and meet all legal and insurance requirements was a personal decision made exclusively by each instructor.

The decision on the part of the Association to make this change was simple. Each class, except for Dance Classes with Jana Moore (already an IC), was operating at a loss to the Association. Furthermore, many of the class attendees are non-residents. In other words, the Association paid out more than it brought in.

Reducing costs and liability are the primary reasons to hire Independent Contractors. This includes employee benefits, taxes, workers comp, and other associated expenses, such as low-class/no-class attendance, but the Association is still obligated to pay the employee. This financial benefit to the Association has been a motivating factor for making this transition.

It's important to note that while teaching recreation classes as an Independent Contractor offers many advantages, it also comes with responsibilities that instructors must be diligent in managing these aspects of their business to ensure success.

Classes will be advertised through RecDesk, the Dobson Ranch website, and the Ranchers' RoundUp. All class registrations are through RecDesk, following the IC Class Policy, but payments will be managed and received by the Independent Contractor only. The IC Class Policy is posted on the website under dobsonranchhoa.com/classes-and-sports.

So, where does this leave us? At an exciting crossroads! As we rebuild and reorganize Dobson Ranch for the future, we want to establish new programs, encourage new-class IC's who are very comfortable with this business model, and develop new activities.




