

Code Compliance Specialist's Message







The Lakes

Lakes & Fish Report

What are those large mosquito-like insects that find their way into my home? They don't seem to bite, but sure do look like mosquitoes.



The insects are crane flies. Crane flies belong to the family Tipulidae, and are true flies. The adult crane fly resembles an oversized mosquito. Attracted by the light inside the house, they fly in the open window or door and start to flap against lampshades or walls. However, they are medically harmless as they do not sting, suck, or transmit disease pathogens.

The larval stage of the crane fly inhabits freshwater and semi-aquatic areas (such as irrigated land). Larvae of some crane fly species can be found in open fields, dry rangeland and even in

desert environments. The larval stage has chewing mouth parts and feed primarily on decomposing organic matter. Some species have also been reported to feed on roots of forage crops, turf grasses and seedling field crops. Crane fly adults only live for a few days and do not usually feed.

In temperate regions, adult crane flies emerge from pupae in the soil in early fall and late spring, when females mate and lay eggs in turf grass within 24 hours. Eggs hatch into wormlike larvae. The larvae feed on roots and crowns of plants during the fall and spring.

Remember, the adult stage of a crane fly is harmless. Their biology is such that their contribution to our ecosystem is largely beneficial because the larvae feed on decaying-organic matter and assist in the biological decomposition process.

NOTE: It is highly recommended to use single barbless hooks when catching and releasing fish. Doing so, will reduce the trauma afflicted to the fish and keep the habitat and fish population healthy! Thank you!


What is the housing market like in Dobson Ranch?

In September 2023, Dobson Ranch home prices were down 11.4% compared to last year, selling for a median price of \$443K. On average, homes in Dobson Ranch sell after 23 days on the market compared to 43 days last year. There were 22 homes sold in September this year, down from 53 last year.

How hot is the Dobson Ranch housing market?

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SERT LANDSCAPING PS & TRICKS

Dust Mites

Dust mites are particularly fond of human and animal dead skin cells that we regularly shed. They like dandruff in particular. Unaltered dandruff has a fat content of 10%, which is too rich for the mites. They depend on a fungus to predigest the dandruff for them lowering the fat content. The mites rarely occur without the fungus, but not the other way around. In humid climates, the fungus can greatly outnumber the mites, making food scarce for the mites. So the greatest challenge for the dust mite is to find a place to live that has high enough humidity to support life, but low enough to slow down the growth of the fungus. Luckily for them, they thrive in about the same amount of humidity that humans feel comfortable in.

Dust mites probably occur in every house in the world. They are about one-hundredth of an inch in diameter, and related to spiders having eight legs at maturity. They are born in dust, live in dust, and die in dust. Population densities can be about 14,000 dust mites per ounce of dust. Dust mites go through six developmental stages, taking about a month to go from an egg to an adult. They don't drink water, absorbing it from the air.

One species of dust mite is primarily responsible for dust allergies: Dermatophagoides. Inhaling their microscopic cast skins and feces are thought to be a factor in some allergy attacks, and what make you itch (if you're susceptible) when you lay on a carpet, old furniture or beds. Mites will also set up housekeeping at the site of scabs, ulcers, fungus infections, and other skin problems.

It is unrealistic to think you can eliminate them from your home completely. The best way to keep them under control is to vacuum thoroughly, preferably using a vacuum with a water filter. Dust first so that it'll settle on the floor before vacuuming. Probably using a good dandruff shampoo will help too. It's best to avoid overstuffed furniture made of fuzzy textures. Use washable curtains or blinds that can be vacuumed or washed in water temperatures of 140F. Have other items steam cleaned or dry cleaned at least once a year. Put plastic covers on mattresses, replace feather pillows and down quilts with synthetic fabrics. Pets with fur and feathers also contribute dander for the dust mites to eat. Keep pet sleeping areas far away from yours, and clean them regularly too.

MAKING EVERY DROP COUNT: CHOOSING THE RIGHT IRRIGATION CONTROLLER FOR YOUR LANDSCAPE

When it comes to landscape irrigation, there are two main options for scheduling water usage: using a smart controller... or "smartly programming" a standard controller. Both options have their benefits and drawbacks, so it's important to understand the differences between them.

A smart controller is a device that uses weather data and/or real-time sensors to automatically adjust irrigation schedules based on historical and current conditions. This means that the controller can turn off irrigation when it's raining or adjust watering times based on temperature and humidity. Smart controllers can save water and money by reducing overwatering and ensuring that plants receive the right amount of water at the right time.

"Smartly programming" a standard controller involves manually adjusting irrigation schedules based on weather conditions and plant needs. This requires more effort and attention than using a smart controller, but can still be an effective way to save water and money. ALCA recommends standard controllers are adjusted by an experienced irrigator monthly if possible, or seasonally (4 times per year), at the minimum. Some standard controllers can be made "smarter" with the addition of add-ons like soil moisture sensors or rain sensors to help them adjust more like a smart controller - this is a great option when an upgrade to a smart controller is not feasible.

So which option is best for your landscape irrigation needs? The size of your landscape, the types of plants you have, and your budget can guide this decsion. Smart controllers can be more expensive than standard controllers, but they can also provide more precise control over irrigation, saving water and money in the long run. "Smartly programming" a standard controller can be a more affordable option at the outset, but requires more time and effort over time.

Ultimately, the key to smart irrigation is using the right tools and techniques for your specific landscape. Whether you choose a smart controller or smartly program a standard controller, make sure to regularly monitor and adjust your irrigation schedule to ensure that your plants are getting the water they need without wasting money and resources.





How much rain do you get? Rainlog.org helps you track and it helps with research - a win-win!

Happy Fall! Hopefully by the time this article comes out, our temperatures will be below 100 degrees. What a summer! Heat records were shattered and the monsoon season was a "non-soon" season.

Are you having the feeling of déjà vu at this moment? If so, it's because last month's article started the exact same way. It has been a hot summer and so far, the afternoon temperatures are not playing along with the change of season. At least now we have cooler mornings and longer shadows...and pumpkin spiced foods and refreshments!

The big question on our weather minds is "are we in for a wet winter?" So far, the amount of rain received at my house is a tad bit more than at this same time last year (3.7" vs 3.425") thanks to the

rainy January. According to the National Weather Service, East Mesa received 9.83" of rain in 2022 (weather.gov). Here at my house, we received 9.54" in 2022.

How do I know my rainfall total so accurately? I am a participant in a citizen science project called **Rainlog.org**. Each morning after it rains, I check our rain gauge and enter the amount received into the Rainlog.org website. This information, the data collection, is the main part of the citizen



science project. All participants' information is displayed on a rain map and the rainfall totals are easy to download to compare by month, season, year over year, etc.

It isn't just the rainfall totals we get to access. Participating in Rainlog.org is helpful to water managers, drought planners, weather reporters, and scientists. The information helps them to get a better picture of precipitation patterns across the Southwest. The Salt River Project (SRP), Arizona Department of Water Resources (ADWR), and the Flood Control District of Maricopa County are a few of the partners.

Rainlog.org is a free program. All you need to participate is by having a rain gauge (ours is plastic and attached to the wall in our backyard), a laptop or smartphone, and an account on Rainlog.org. Kids of all ages can participate so join your neighbors and register today. (And yes, reading about Rainlog.org may seem like déjà vu, too. The first time I wrote about the program was a "Letter to the Editor" in the Ranchers' RoundUp, May 2014, as a grad student. How time flies-Go RedHawks and go rainy winter!)

Speaking of SRP, thanks again to the residents that participated in this summer's Shade Tree Program workshops. Remember to pick up your free saplings at Mesa Community College on Sat., November 18 from 8:00 am - 1:00 pm.

To all residents who took advantage of the cooler mornings this fall and added new landscaping, be sure to enter any new trees to Mesa's Trees are Cool Initiative at www.mesalistens.com/trees-are-cool. By doing so, you'll help the City of Mesa reach its goals of planting 1,000,000 new trees and increasing the city's tree canopy coverage to 15% by 2050.

Mandy has been with the United Food Bank for over seven months as Food Drive Manager, leading food drives and distribution, and has already accomplished a lot! "The United Food Bank is a very collaborative environment, and my team is always open to new ideas. I saw that Feeding America had



a campaign called Hunger Action Month, so in September, I asked my manager if we could put together a Family Action Month, where we'd invite families to participate in volunteering of all ages. We had that Family Action service day on September 8th and invited families to come to the food bank. It was wonderful to see these families working together and heartwarming when the little ones would carry jars of peanut butter or green beans to put into the donation care packages," smiled Mandy.

Now, Mandy is preparing for her first holiday season with United Food Bank. Mandy explained, "November and December have the highest volume of donations. We are preparing to have a very busy and successful season, hosting turkey and food drives, partnering with local organizations, and recruiting volunteers to send out food on a larger scale. Our two major food



distributions will be on November 20th and December 20th."

As Mandy looks forward to the holiday season, she can't help but smile. Her work at the United Food Bank is more than a job; it is a calling. Her journey, full of twists and turns, had brought her to this place, at this moment. And she is prepared for whatever challenges lay ahead.

Mandy's story is a reminder that each one of us could make a significant impact on our community, regardless of where we come from or what path we have traveled. NOTICE ABOUT INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS & CLASS ACTIVITIES

Effective November 1, 2023 the transition of class instructors from full-time employees to Independent Contractors (IC) has led to a noticeable decline in the number of classes offered at Dobson Ranch. Each instructor was allowed to become an Independent Contractor; accepting to do so and meet all legal and insurance requirements was a personal decision made exclusively by each instructor.

The decision on the part of the Association to make this change was simple. Each class, except for Dance Classes with Jana Moore (already an IC), was operating at a loss to the Association. Furthermore, many of the class attendees are non-residents. In other words, the Association paid out more than it brought in.

Reducing costs and liability are the primary reasons to hire Independent Contractors. This includes employee benefits, taxes, workers comp, and other associated expenses, such as low-class/no-class attendance, but the Association is still obligated to pay the employee. This financial benefit to the Association has been a motivating factor for making this transition.

It's important to note that while teaching recreation classes as an Independent Contractor offers many advantages, it also comes with responsibilities that instructors must be diligent in managing these aspects of their business to ensure success.


Classes will be advertised through RecDesk, the Dobson Ranch website, and the Ranchers' RoundUp. All class registrations are through RecDesk, following the IC Class Policy, but payments will be managed and received by the Independent Contractor only. The IC Class Policy is posted on the website under dobsonranchhoa.com/classes-and-sports.

So, where does this leave us? At an exciting crossroads! As we rebuild and reorganize Dobson Ranch for the future, we want to establish new programs, encourage new-class IC's who are very comfortable with this business model, and develop new activities.
